Thank you for your email of 8 February 2010 concerning the Government's proposal to move Year 7 to secondary school.

I appreciate your views on the placement of Year 7, and the concerns you have about children growing up too quickly, and missing out on opportunities to consolidate their skills and build their confidence in environments they find familiar and safe.

These are legitimate views, and I have taken the liberty of forwarding a copy of your letter to the Honourable Geoff Wilson MP, Minister for Education and Training, so that it can be considered as part of the response to the discussion paper, A Flying Start for Queensland Children.

The first full Prep cohort will be Year 7 in 2015, when more than half of the students will turn 13 during the course of Year 7 Although the 2014 Year 7s are not going to be quite as old as the 2015 Year 7s, they will be older than their predecessors at the same stage of schooling. They will have had eight full years in a primary setting. They will be learning the national curriculum—in English, Maths, Science and History—which will be fully implemented by 2013, and will benefit from specialist teachers in specialist settings.

I refer to your email dated 8 February 2010 to the Honourable Anna Bligh MP, Premier of Queensland, regarding the Government's proposal to move Year 7 to secondary school. The Premier has referred your letter to the Honourable Geoff Wilson MP, Minister for Education and Training, for consideration. The Minister has asked me to respond to you on his behalf. I apologise for the delay in replying.

Your response to the Government's proposal to move Year 7 to secondary school is appreciated. The Department of Education and Training has recorded your concerns and ideas and they will be considered along with feedback received from the wider Queensland community on the A Flying Start for Queensland Children: Education Green Paper for public consultation.

The welfare of Year 7 children entering secondary school is a paramount consideration. The Department is working on the assessment of what will be needed if Year 7 is moved to secondary school. Part of this work is investigating middle schooling approaches to create learning environments that will be appropriate to the age of students in the lower years of secondary school.

The basis behind the proposal to move (ear) to secondary school is multifaceted. Year 7 students will be older. The introduction of the Prep year means that, if no further changes are made, from 2014 children will spend eight full years in primary school. Also, in 2008 the Queensland Government raised the compulsory school starting age by six months. As a result, in 2015 at least half of Year 7 children will turn 13 by the end of Year 7.

You have asked about international evidence concerning Year 7 in high schools. Many educationally high-performing countries, such as Canada, Finland, Singapore and the UK include Year 7 in secondary school. Importantly, the international evidence also suggests that the success of the placing Year 7 in secondary school can be enhanced by the quality of the educational experiences that these students receive.


The first phase of the Australian national curriculum commences in 2011 and will be in place by 2013. The Queensland Government wants to ensure that Queensland's Year 7 students have every opportunity to benefit from the new national curriculum, with similar access to specialist teachers and facilities as their counterparts in most other states. In secondary schools, subject specialists can help to ensure a depth of learning in areas including the sciences, history, languages, arts and technology.

Thank you for your personal representations dated 11 March 2010 on behalf of of Bethany Lutheran Primary School regarding proposals in the discussion paper, A Flying Start for Queensland Children: Education Green Paper for public consultation.

On 15 April, made a detailed submission to the Flying Start consultation process. submission outlines the estimated impact the loss of the Year 7 cohort may have on the financial and educational viability of Bethany Lutheran Primary School. The submission has been recorded and acknowledged by the Department of Education and Training.

As outlined in the Education Green Paper, preliminary costings indicate that capital funding of between \$300 and \$350 million over the next four years might be required to implement the proposal to move Year 7 to secondary. There may also be recurrent costs associated with employing specialist teachers, purchasing text books and other items.

The Department is working to quantify the investment required for this change and the local impacts that may result, taking advice and submissions from stakeholders. As part of this, the Department will consult with the Association of Independent Schools Queensland to identify effects on non-state schools Support for the non-state schooling sectors to make the change will be considered by the Government in due course. The Government will publish a policy paper later in 2010 setting out the next steps.

It is important for all Queen landers to have their say on the Flying Start Green Paper and provide feedback to ensure all the impacts of the initiatives proposed are known and considered before the Government makes a final decision.

Thank you for your email dated 18 February 2010 regarding the Queensland Government's proposal to move Year 7 into secondary school. The Honourable Geoff Wilson MP, Minister for Education and Training, has asked me to respond to you on his behalf

The rationale behind the Year 7 into secondary school proposal is multifaceted. In 2007, the Queensland Government introduced the Prep Year and, in 2008, increased the compulsory school starting age by six months. This means that, if no further changes are made, from 2014 children will spend eight full years in primary school. In 2015, more than half of Year 7 children will turn 13 while in Year 7.

In most Australian states, Year 7 is the first year of high school where young people have access to specialist teachers and specialist facilities for learning. In secondary schools, subject specialists help ensure the depth of learning in areas including the sciences, history, languages, arts and technology. Facilities in secondary schools, such a science laboratories, engage students in more complex, hands-on environments than those able to be provided in the generalist primary school setting.

Furthermore, the Australian national curriculum will commence from 2011 and the first phase will be in place by 2013. We need to ensure that Queensland's Year 7 students have every opportunity to benefit from the new national curriculum, with similar access to specialist teachers and facilities as most other states and territories already provide.

Moving Year 7 to secondary will mean Year 7 students will have access to specialist teachers and facilities. Preliminary costings indicate that the change will require capital funding of \$300 million to \$350 million over the next four years.

Strong school discipline is imperative to the success of schooling. For the state school system, the Government has already announced tougher powers for principals and stronger behaviour standards for students.

There is room for improved behaviour management programs. On 2 February 2010, the Honourable Anna Bligh MP, Premier of Queensland, and the Honourable Geoff Wilson MP launched the Education Green Paper A Flying Start for Queensland Children for public consultation website. The issues you have raised are relevant to the Government's proposal to establish a single, consolidated standards authority to set and monitor high educational standards and the planned review of teacher training courses. One of the Flying Start consultation survey questions asks for the public to share their views on ways we can ensure classrooms are free from disruption and focused on learning.

The Department has recorded your input into the consultation process, and is currently collating and analysing all feedback received from the Queensland community. After the public consultation has concluded, all input will be considered and the Sovernment will publish a policy paper setting out the next steps later in 2010.

Dear Premier,

I am encouraged by your request for opinions from the community as regards this issue. This issue will be placed in differing socio-economic and cultural contexts. You are no doubt aware that in some private schools this has already been adopted-with middle school being years 7,8,9 and high school years 10,11,12. My son attends one of these and is a year 10 student. Think it would be worthwhile discussing this with Principals and staff of these schools and in doing so ask them to objectively compare the 'old' with the new. Also do a survey with all High top and small country school Principals and staff to see what they perceive as the costs and benefits of this system.

For families living away from access to high schools or senior secondary school this will create difficulties. In some rural towns a high top (to year 10) exists. With the advent of senior school being years 10,11,12 parents will feel pressured to send their children in year 10 to achieve best results and the high tops will lose their year 10 students and possibly a teacher. Financially for some of these families this will mean greater costs—a child at year 10 will most likely need new uniform by year 12 due to growth as well as an additional 12 months school and boarding fees. Families lucky enough to access ICPA funding will be better off but will still be looking at possibly sending their child/children away 12 months earlier than previously.

Each family makes choices as they see right

I believe that year 7 should remain a primary school level due to the physiological, emotional and psychological changes that in most children occur in their teens. I feel the year 7s are a valuable part of the primary school cohort and do not see why they should be pushed earlier into a high-school—setting. Again the small country schools and 1 teacher school will lose pupils if year 7 becomes the beginning of high school. Parents choosing to commence their children at a high school in year 7 will take them out of the little local school and board them so that they receive all their high school education from the same school. I know a number of local parents from my community who have made this choice so that their children do not have their secondary education disturbed part way through-they send them away at year 8 to glean the benefits of the full 5 years of secondary school.

I refer to your email dated 2 July 2010 regarding the Education Green Paper: A Flying Start for Queensland Children to the Honourable Anna Bligh MP, Premier of Queensland. The Premier has forwarded your email to the Honourable Geoff Wilson MP, Minister for Education and Training, for consideration. The Minister has asked me to respond to you on his behalf.

As you point out, many Queensland schools already include Year 7 with secondary year levels, including P-10 and P-12 state colleges and many non-state schools. What these schools do well is to make sure that Year 7 students are looked after and are carefully inducted into secondary education. Many of them adopt "middle school" approaches, and bring Years 7, 8 and 9 into a "school within a school" that provides the care and support needed in the developing years for young people.

Public consultation on the Flying Start Green Paper has shown significant support for models of schooling that are able to provide support for young adolescents in a secondary environment.

I note your concerns about the proposed move of Year 7 to secondary school, including the potential impact on parents, children and small primary schools in rural and remote areas. These issues have also emerged from the Flying Start Green Paper public consultation process along with issues about the social, emotional and psychological readiness of Year 7 students for the transition to secondary school, and are being carefully considered by the Department of Education and Training.

The Department is investigating local circumstances for students, families and schools in rural and remote areas to identify issues associated with the impact of the proposed move of Year 7 so that the Government can make an informed decision about the proposed move. Learnings from schools that already include Year 7 with secondary year levels will also inform the Government's consideration of this issue.

## REQUEST:

Regarding the proposal to move Year 7 to high school, please identify how this transition will affect the implementation of the national curriculum.

#### Response

- Reasons given by the government for moving Year 7 to secondary school include:
  - Year 7 students have much to gain from experiencing a range of different teaching styles and expertise.
  - Teachers with specialist discipline knowledge can help Year 7 students develop depth of understanding and skill in particular areas.
  - Year 7 students have a better chance of benefiting from the national curriculum if they have access to specialist teachers and facilities in the secondary school.
- Queensland schools will implement the K(Prep) -10 Australian Curriculum in English, mathematics and science from 2012, and history from 2012. This will be followed by implementation of Phase 2 and 3 in Prep - 10. ACARA is to develop Phase 2 learning areas by 2011 and Phase 3 learning areas by 2012.
- The proposed shift of Year 7 into secondary schools is to be from 2014. Some schools are already offering Year 7 in secondary school.
- Current considerations and planning for the proposed shift of Year 7 into secondary school, acknowledge that the best predictor of student progress in the middle years is "the quality of teaching and learning and what happens within the classroom".
- The pre-service teacher preparation, professional development and school leadership necessary for a successful shift of Year 7 into secondary schools will reinforce and complement the focus on implementation of the Australian Curriculum. It will promote:
  - strong content knowledge and pedagogical knowledge specific to the Australian Curriculum.
  - the capabilities to develop students literacy, numeracy and ICT skills as part of the teaching and learning within the subjects taught.
- The Australian Curriculum for Year 7 is written for delivery in either primary or secondary schools. However, it requires a greater level of disciplinary knowledge in Year 7 than is now commonly expected in Queensland. Increasing teachers' disciplinary knowledge will be a focus of support provided to Queensland schools to implement the Australian Curriculum.
- The Australian Curriculum for the arts (Phase 2), and for technologies, economics/business and civics and citizenship (Phase 3) is to be written in twoyear bands – rather than year-by-year; with Years 7 and 8 as one of these bands.
- The government's proposal to move Year 7 into secondary schooling provides an opportunity for a renewed focus on effective curriculum delivery in Years 7

I am writing on behalf of the Building Committee for Kingarov Kindergarten in First Avenue.

Our current building was relocated there and opened in 1978. We are currently well advanced down the path of building a new Kindy on the land next door to the existing building. This will require a commitment of approximately \$400,000 of which we can at best get about \$120,000 in grants. Kindy will need to fund the rest through cash funds and bank loans.

Our major concerns which have now brought us to a halt, is the attached "green paper" of the Queensland Governments. In particular, page 5 under the sub neading of "A Kindy Year". It states that "Up to 240 kindergartens are being built across the state and all children aged 3½ to 4½ years will have access to a quality kindergarten program by 2014, so they are ready for the next stage of their learning. The kindergarten programs will be provided through community-based services, on school sites and through long day care centres. The first eight of the new kindergartens will open this year, and another 12 will open in 2011."

We were not overly concerned as it stated that these would be "provided through community-based services" of which we are also affiliated with the government funded C&K Association. However, the alarm bells started to ring very loud and clear for us when our investigations revealed some of the processes involved. It would appear that the process is:

1/ the Education Department identify high growth areas.

2/ they then consult with C&K and receive recommendations only", which they may or may not take into account.

3/ once an area is then approved by the Education Dept, they will then build brand new Kindergartens in the State School grounds to be run by the school.

From our information so far, it would appear that Kingaroy is not on the list before 2012, but there is a "Draft" list for 2013 and 2014 which, it has been suggested, Kingaroy might be on. One would have assumed that with the current growth rates in Kingaroy, that this would be very likely. If it is on this list, then we also understand that they will then build Kindergartens at both Taabinga and Kingaroy State Schools. These would obviously totally funded by the Government and be free for attendees.

As you could well understand, this is causing us great consternation as it would leave us with a new building with no, or minimal attendees.

What our Kindergarten was hoping you could help us with, is some investigations with the Education Department, or other relevant parties, to clarify a few items.

1/ Is the above process a fairly accurate description of what is actually happening?

2/ Where are the new Kindergartens that are opening in 2010 and 2011 been built. (i.e. Community Kindergartens or school run and in what towns)

3/ Is Kingaroy a possible location for these state run Kindergartens in 2012 and 2013 or even later?

4/ If so, when and at what locations?

5/ What is the Education Dept plans for Community Kindergartens in the future as it would appear that their days are limited?

6/ Would they consider building new Kindergartens for community non-profit organizations as an alternative? (they currently only offer a grant of up to \$50,000 through C&K for capital works)

7/ If this is their plan, then obviously they must realise that Community Kindergartens will shut as they must charge to attend and hence will not be able to compete with free State run Kindergartens. What are their plans for the assets of Community Kindergartens, when they are forced to shut, that have been accumulated through many many years of voluntary work and community donations?

It would be greatly appreciated if you could please try to obtain this and any other pertinent information that would be beneficial for us in determining the feasibility of our project. You would be able to seek information at a far higher level than we can and hopefully they will be me forthright with you.

We would also be happy to travel to Brisbane for a meeting with yourself and Department of Education representatives if you thought that this was necessary and beneficial.

Thank you for your further enquiry dated 30 April 2010 on behalf of of the Kingaroy Kindergarten in First Avenue, regarding the Queensland Government's kindergarten initiatives.
I have provided answers to initial set of questions in my previous letter of reply to you dated 5 May 2010 and enclosed for your information has asked a further question concerning the possibility that space created in primary schools by Year 7 moving to secondary might be used for kindergartens.
As the Flying Start Green Paper states, to ascertain costs and implementation options of the Year 7 move, the Department of Education and Training will conduct a school-by-school audit of local circumstances and school capacities. At the present time, these audits have only been performed for state secondary schools. Information concerning primary schools has not yet been obtained.
My previous letter outlined the rigorous process of the Office for Early Childhood Education and Care (the Office) to identify areas of need for extra kindergarten places across the State, based on an analysis of supply and demand. At this stage, the Office has identified that the Kingaroy Statistical Local Area has no immediate need for additional kindergarten places given the existing kindergarten and long day care services.
In addition, it should be noted that the Queensland Government prefers that extra kindergarten services are co-located on schools to provide families with maximum convenience and to assist in school readiness. Kindergarten services co-located on state school sites will be operated by the Creche and Kindergarten Association of Queensland (C&K).

Thank you for your letter dated 3 March 2010 regarding the Government's discussion paper A Flying Start for Queensland Children: Education Green Paper for public consultation. I apologise for the delay in replying.

As you would be aware, all jurisdictions have signed up to the Australian national curriculum with the first phase to be implemented for Years Prep-10 by the end of 2013. In most Australian jurisdictions, Year 7 is the first year of secondary school and provides students with access to specialist teachers and facilities. A key proposal of the Education Green Paper is to make these opportunities available to all Queensland Year 7 students, whether in the state or non-state schooling sectors, by positioning Year 7 as the first year of secondary school.

I am advised that of the 467 non-state schools in Queenstand, 228 are primary schools, 82 are secondary schools, and 157 combine primary and secondary year levels, including P–12 and P–10 schools. In the independent schools sector, some 73 per cent of schools combine primary and secondary years. In this context, I am pleased to note that media reports are indicating that a large number of independent schools support the proposed move of Year 7 to secondary school, and that the independent schools sector is well placed to make this change.

It is likely that there will be costs associated with implementation of the proposal and, as outlined in the Education Green Paper, preliminary costings indicate that capital funding of between \$300–350 million over the next four years might be required. There will also be recurrent costs associated with employing specialist teachers, purchasing text books and other items.

It is important for all Queenslanders to have their say on the Flying Start Green Paper feedback to ensure all the impacts of the initiatives proposed are known and considered before the Government makes a final decision.

As advice and submissions are received from stakeholders, the Department of Education and Training is working to quantify the capital and recurrent investment required for this change. Support for the non-state schooling sectors to make the change will be considered by the Government in due course.

### PROPOSAL TO MOVE YEAR 7 INTO HIGH SCHOOL - CAUCUS LIAISON REQUEST

### Green Paper - The proposal

- The Green Paper 'A Flying Start for Queensland Children' contains a proposal to move Year 7 into secondary school from 2014.
- Government has committed to making a decision on this matter before the end of 2010 following consultation with the community.

### Key drivers for the proposal

- By 2015, the impact of the introduction of Prep in 2007 and the increased compulsory school starting age in 2008 means that by 2015 children in Year 7 will have spent eight full years in primary school, and more than half of them will turn 13 years old by the end of Year 7.
- By 2013, the first four national curriculum subjects (English, Maths, Science and History) will be fully implemented in our schools, and Year 7 students will benefit from access to specialist expertise and facilities.
- Socially and emotionally, children of this age are seeking out new challenges, new friends and new experiences; academically they need appropriate levels of challenge to remain interested.

### Financial and infrastructure impacts

- The change will affect 178 state and 81 non-state secondary schools.
- Preliminary work indicates that such a move would cost between \$300 \$350m over the next four years.
- If no change is made to the placement of Year 7, an investment of \$159m would still be required by 2015 to accommodate the full cohorts in primary school (Prep to Year 7).

### Consultation

- The Department of Education and Training is delivering public consultation forums across
   Queensland. Dates and locations of these forums are provided on the Department of Education and Training's website at <a href="https://www.deta.qld.gov.au/aflyingstart/index.html">www.deta.qld.gov.au/aflyingstart/index.html</a>, as the dates and locations are finalised.
- Media reports identify that:
  - A large number of Queensland independent schools have been calling for Year 7 to be part of secondary school over the past year and Independent Schools Queensland believe that it will be important for Queensland to make this move as soon as practical with the introduction of a national curriculum.
  - The Queensland Teachers Union has stated that the cost of making Year 7 part of secondary school has been underestimated.
  - The Queensland Council of Parents and Citizens Association has stated that extra government allowances could ensure that isolated and remote families would not be burdened (by moving Year 7 to secondary school).
- The Isolated Children's Parents Association has expressed concerns regarding the financial and emotional cost of moving Year 7 to secondary school for isolated rural and remote families especially in circumstances where there is no provision for secondary school in the local community.
- The Department of Education and Training is in the process of forming a stakeholder Advisory Committee that will include representation from key stakeholders including education sectors, unions, peak principal and parent groups. This Committee will complement submissions as key mechanisms to engage stakeholders in consideration of the Green Paper initiatives and proposals.

Thank you for your letter dated 2 February 2010 and our meeting of 9 March 2010 regarding the proposal to move Year 7 from primary school to secondary school and the potential impact this may have on families within your electorate. I apologise for the delay in replying.

The Green Paper, A Flying Start for Queensland Children, which was released in February 2010, allows an opportunity for families to provide feedback on initiatives and proposals, including moving Year 7 to secondary school, so that the Queensland Government can carefully consider local issues and solutions ahead of any changes.

I understand the concerns of your constituents about potentially sending their Year 7 children to secondary school away from home. We are investigating local circumstances and school capacities in order to better understand the types of assistance and support that would be beneficial to isolated rural and remote communities.

I appreciated the opportunity to meet with you and representatives of the Isolated Children's Parents' Association and the Queensland Council of Parents and Citizens' Association recently. As a result of this meeting, the Department of Education and Training will specifically consult with representatives of isolated children and their parents. I encourage your constituents to engage in the public consultation process by making submissions to the Department and attending public consultation forums.

The public consultation forums are being held so that families and community members are provided with an opportunity to understand why we are proposing these changes, to ask questions and to discuss how support can be given for the transition to secondary school. Dates and locations of these forums are provided on the Department of Education and Training's website online at www.deta.qld.gov.au/aflyingstart/index.html. At your suggestion, we will also work to organise a virtual forum via the schools of distance education, in the near future.

In regard to the age at which children commence Year 7, from 2014 they will be older than in previous years. In 2008, the Government raised the age of compulsory schooling, and as a result the youngest Year 7 students will be 11 years and 6 months old at the commencement of Year 7 from 2014 onwards, compared to 11 years old in previous years.

In addition, the Australian national curriculum, the first stage of which rolls out between 2011 and 2013, will require our Year 7 students to have access to specialist teachers and facilities. By planning now, we have four to five years to develop a program which will support the transition needs of young people, prepare our school facilities and address the concerns of families across Queensland.

## 7. How does the age of children in the first year of high school compare to other States and Territories.

- The proposal to put Year 7 into high school will bring Queensland in line with most other states and territories.
- QLD children will be the same age as NT children in Year 7 in high school. (Turning 12 or 13)
- QLD children will be similar (give or take a month) in age to NSW, VIC, ACT. (Turning 12 or 13)
- Most QLD children will be the same age as Year 7 students in high school in TAS. (Turning 13)
- SA and WA have Year 8 as high school. Their children will be a year older in first year of high school. (turning 13 or 14)

## 8. What is the advantages of moving Year 7 children to high school.

- The National Curriculum is establishing consistent educational standards across Australia.
- The new National Curriculum is being developed against world standard benchmarks.
- As the National curriculum begins to roll out from 2011, we need to ensure that Queensland children are provided with the best opportunity to benefit from the National Curriculum.
- The question we need to ask, particularly in areas such as science, is "where will our children gain the best advantaged in their learning, primary school or secondary school."?
- Leading states such as NSW and VIC already have Year 7 in high school. For science, maths and the subjects, their Year 7 children have access to specialist teachers in high school and specialist facilities.

So the questions we must ask ourselves are:

- 1. Where are these older year 7 children best placed for schooling?
- 2. Should they have access to specialist teachers and facilities to ensure they receive the same advantage in their education as children in other states?
- 3. If so, should the children move to secondary school to access the specialists or should the specialist facilities and teachers by placed in primary schools?

## 9. When is the National Curriculum Starting?

- The National Curriculum will start rolling out in 2011. Phase 1, including English, Maths, Science, and History will start next year with full implementation across Australia planned by 2013.
- Phase 2. Geometry is expected to be rolled out in 2012, with full implementation in 2014.
- Dates for the other curriculum is yet to be determined.
- By 2015 when the current children in Prep reach Year 7 we will be well underway with National curriculum

## 10. Should children as young as 11.5 years old be moved into high school with 17 and 18 year old Year 12 students.

- Safety of children in our schools is our number one priority.
- Schools have systems and processes in place now to support the transition of children to high school. Strategies such as, home or care teachers, separate play area for children in their first year of high school are employed to assist with their transition.
- We already have P-12 schools throughout the state and non-state sector, where children in Year 7 transition to the high school. These schools have established procedures and processes to ensure the safety of the children. These Year 7 children are currently benefiting from specialist teachers and facilities.

  The other question to ask is "Should we have children as old as 12 ½
- years in primary schools with 4 1/2 years old?

## 11. How many children will be affected by this change?

When the Prep cohort start going through only 1/2 the children in year 7 will be affected:

- Queensland children born Jan-June will be the same age in Year 7 with Prep as they would have been before Prep. These children will go to high school a year younger than they would if they were to start high school at year 8.
- However, children their age in most other states, and in QLD P-12 schools, are already at high school in year 7.

The other children in the group (those born between July and December) will be a year older in Year 7 so will be going through to high school at the same age as if they were going to Year 8 (before the introduction of Prep)

Dear Premier,

I am encouraged by your request for opinions from the community as regards this issue. This issue will be placed in differing socio-economic and cultural contexts. You are no doubt aware that in some private schools this has already been adopted-with middle school being years 7,8,9 and high school years 10,11,12. My son attends one of these and is a year 10 student. I think it would be worthwhile discussing this with Principals and staff of these schools and in doing so ask them to objectively compare the 'old' with the new. Also do a survey with all High top and small country school Principals and staff to see what they perceive as the costs and benefits of this system.

For families living away from access to high schools or senior secondary school this will create difficulties. In some rural towns a high top (to year 10) exists. With the advent of senior school being years 10,11,12 parents will feel pressured to send their children in year 10 to achieve best results and the high tops will lose their year 10 students and possibly a teacher. Financially for some of these families this will mean greater costs, a child at year 10 will most likely need new uniform by year 12 due to growth as well as an additional 12 months school and boarding fees. Families lucky enough to access ICPA funding will be better off but will still be looking at possibly sending their child/children away 12 months earlier than previously.

Each family makes choices as they see right.

I believe that year 7 should remain a primary school level due to the physiological, emotional and psychological changes that in most children occur in their teens. I feel the year 7s are a valuable part of the primary school cohort and do not see why they should be pushed earlier into a high-school—setting. Again the small country schools and 1 teacher school will lose pupils if year 7 becomes the beginning of high school. Parents choosing to commence their children at a high school in year 7 will take them out of the little local school and board them so that they receive all their high school education from the same school. I know a number of local parents from my community who have made this choice so that their children do not have their secondary education disturbed part way through-they send them away at year 8 to glean the benefits of the full 5 years of secondary school.

I refer to your email dated 2 July 2010 regarding the Education Green Paper: A Flying Start for Queensland Children to the Honourable Anna Bligh MP, Premier of Queensland. The Premier has forwarded your email to the Honourable Geoff Wilson MP, Minister for Education and Training, for consideration. The Minister has asked me to respond to you on his behalf.

As you point out, many Queensland schools already include Year 7 with secondary year levels, including P-10 and P-12 state colleges and many non-state schools. What these schools do well is to make sure that Year 7 students are looked after and are carefully inducted into secondary education. Many of them adopt "middle school" approaches, and bring Years 7, 8 and 9 into a "school within a school" that provides the care and support needed in the developing years for young people.

Public consultation on the Flying Start Green Paper has shown significant support for models of schooling that are able to provide support for young adolescents in a secondary environment.

I note your concerns about the proposed move of Year 7 to secondary school, including the potential impact on parents, children and small primary schools in rural and remote areas. These issues have also emerged from the Flying Start Green Paper public consultation process along with issues about the social emotional and psychological readiness of Year 7 students for the transition to secondary school, and are being carefully considered by the Department of Education and Training.

The Department is investigating local circumstances for students, families and schools in rural and remote areas to identify issues associated with the impact of the proposed move of Year 7 so that the Government carr make an informed decision about the proposed move. Learnings from schools that already include Year 7 with secondary year levels will also inform the Government's consideration of this issue.

I am writing this letter to complain bitterly about sending year 7's to secondary school in 2014. We will have a daughter in year 7 that year, and as we live 75kms to the nearest school and no school bus we would have to send her to a boarding school 1 year earlier. We think she would be too young to become independant from her family for most of the year. She would also be travelling for 500kms on a public bus by herself and I think that would be dangerous for a 12 year old child. She has a younger brother who would be on a property with no other children for playmates for three years rather than two which would make him very lonely. I know we will have difficultes in being able to afford another year of boarding school fees. I think that bush children are disadvantaged enough with distance education, lack of access to teaching resources and isolation without making the big leap into mainstream schools more difficult. I also think that secondary school is a big step for children socially and an extra year to be a child is beneficial.

Proposal

That the Principal Advisor note the references to Middle Schooling in the Flying Start Green Paper, invited in community consultation forums, and addressed in public submissions received are of a substantial nature and do not support the claim that they are not included in the consultation process.

**Urgency** 

1. Urgent the Minister's Office has requested this briefing by COB 9 June 2010.

### **Fast Facts**

 To date, over 80 public forums have been conducted with over 2300 attendees and over 1200 individual non-forum submissions.

**Background** 

- 2. On 9 June 2010, Dr Bruce Flegg MP, Shadow Minister for Education and Training and Member for Moggill, made a statement in Parliament which suggested that the Queensland Government has failed to realise the potential of middle schooling and failed to consult on middle schooling with regard to the Flying Start Green Paper.
- 3. An earlier LNP response to the Green Paper is provided on the website of Dr Bruce Flegg, <a href="http://www.trp.org.au/">www.moggill.net</a> and is also on the LNP website <a href="http://www.trp.org.au/">http://www.trp.org.au/</a>.
- 4. On 2 February 2010, the Green Paper A Flying Start for Queensland Children was released by the Premier and the Minister for public consultation. The Green Paper canvasses the proposal to move Year 7 to secondary schooling along with other options.
- 5. The Green Paper emphasises the Middle years strategy amongst major educational reforms (p.3):

"Middle years strategy

In state schools, the middle phase of learning action plan saw class size targets reduce from one teacher for every 30 students to one teacher for every 28 students in the middle years — among the lowest middle years class size targets in the country. Teachers received extensive professional development in the teaching of literacy and numeracy. High-performing teachers were also supported to become middle phase leaders."

- 6. The Green Paper (p 17) makes references to different models of schooling and recognises that much can be learned from Middle Schooling approaches if Year 7 is moved to secondary school: "Some ... schools already organise their teaching and learning in a way that treats Year 7 differently from regular primary school and there are many things to be learnt from the practices and experience of these schools."
- 7. In its discussion questions for consultation (pp 25 26), the Green Paper explicitly asks: "Q6. What do you think are the major development issues affecting young teenagers that need to be considered in any move of Year 7 to secondary?

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Department	Cilo Dof	10/137592
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Q7. Should the early years of secondary school be changed to help students adjust to the transition?"

#### Key issues

- 8. Submissions relating to the Green Paper are being accepted until 30 June 2010. Responses received to date indicate the greatest interest from various members of the public (e.g. parents, teachers, principals, etc) to be associated with the proposed move of Year 7 to secondary school.
- 9. To date, more than 80 community forums have been conducted with over 2390 attendees. As well, more than 1200 written and online submissions have been received.
- 10. Overall, responses in both forums and non-forum submissions have clearly emphasised the need to ease the transition of students to Year 7 in secondary schooling or to consider alternative teaching and learning models. Three main themes emerging in this regard include: introducing transition programs to aid schools and communities, introducing pastoral care to support students, and gaining the benefits of adopting a middle schooling model.
- 11. Middle Schooling has represented a strong theme amongst others being received. People's concepts of Middle School have varied, but included suggestions such as separating Year 7 or Year 7-9 students from older students within the one secondary campus or on a separate middle school campus, or ensuring that the Year 7 program is a mixture of the primary and secondary school models to facilitate a more successful transition between the two models of schooling. This might include providing a home teacher, a home room with teachers rather than students moving, a single teacher for core subjects (e.g. English, Maths), reduced numbers of teachers, reduced student workload/homework, etc.
- 12. There has been consistency across submissions in relation to the benefits of middle schooling that people were calling for. Some of these benefits included safety, greater relevance and student engagement, and focus on the age group and on related teacher training.
- 13. Results of consultation will be presented in a public report once the consultation process has been completed and the Government has considered the outcomes.

The Government has long supported reforms in middle schooling. Back in 2002, the *Education* and *Training Reforms for the Future* focussed attention on the middle phase.

The Government has reduced class size targets for the middle years to amongst the lowest in Australia. It has provided specific middle phase professional development.

The current Flying Start Education Green Paper reminds us of these middle schooling reforms.

The paper also points out that many Queensland schools – both state and non-state –already use middle schooling approaches. The paper seeks to learn from these schools in considering the proposal to move Year 7 to secondary school.

More than 80 Flying Start community consultation forums have been held, involving over 2300 people across Queensland. In those forums, participants have been overwhelmingly supportive of placing Year 7 in secondary.

Date: Trim Ref: 9 June 2010 10/138021 The consultations have posed middle schooling as a way to assist students make the move from Year 6 to Year 7, if Year 7 is in secondary.

In the forums and in over 1200 written submissions, people have clearly confirmed the need to ease the transition of students to Year 7 in secondary schooling.

They have suggested ideas for middle schooling. Here are some: organising curriculum across Years 7, 8 and 9; providing separate areas for Year 7 or Year 7-9 students; making the Year 7 program a blend of primary and secondary school, and strong pastoral care.

They have also made a host of practical suggestions that many schools already use with their middle school or lower secondary students. Suggestions like home teachers; home rooms where the teachers move rather than the students; just one teacher for core subjects (eg both English and Maths); reducing the numbers of teachers students work with; reduced student workload or homework, and so on.

They are enthusiastic about the benefits that they see coming from middle schooling approaches: better safety for students, greater subject relevance and student engagement, a focus on the age group and on related teacher training.

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

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
