SUBJECT: INDEPENDENT PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Summary of key objectives

To seek that the Minister:

- Approve the scope of the Queensland Government's Independent Public Schools initiative
 outlined in the prospectus (Attachment 1) and the principles outlined in Independent Public
 Schools at a glance (Attachment 2)
- Note the associated promotional material and research summary (Attachments 3 7)
- Approve the package of materials that has been prepared for the media including the prospectus (Attachment 1), At a glance (Attachment 2), a media Q&A (Attachment 8), and a media release (Attachment 9)
- Approve the attached letter be forwarded to the Premier seeking his endorsement of the Foreword in the Independent Public Schools prospectus (Attachment 10).

Key issues

- 1. The proposed scope of the Independent Public Schools program is outlined in:
 - Independent Public Schools prospectus the key document providing an overview of the initiative, key areas of additional independence and the expression of interest form (Attachment 1).
 - At a glance a brief summary of all components of the Independent Public Schools initiative (Attachment 2).
- 2. These characteristics have been discussed and have in-principle support from stakeholders such as the principals associations and Queensland Council of Parents and Citizens Associations (QCPCA).
- 3. Stakeholders have raised five key issues. The key issues and the department's responses are:
 - Stakeholders do not want:
 - the Queensland Independent Public Schools initiative to establish a culture of the 'haves' and 'have nots' in state schools, which has reportedly occurred in Western Australia. Their preference is that all schools are able to become Independent Public Schools.

Response: Independent Public Schools is shaped to ensure there is not a twotiered system.

ii. Independent Public Schools to be able to brand themselves as such.

Response: Independent Public Schools will not be used as a brand however schools will be able to brand their innovative programs.

 Stakeholders are concerned that the Independent Public Schools' capacity to recruit teachers outside of the department's processes will undermine the existing transfer system.

Response: The existing transfer system will be strengthened and maintained.

 Stakeholders have identified that there is not conclusive evidence to prove the effectiveness of Independent Public Schools.

Response: Independent Public Schools draws on large scale studies such as that conducted by the OECD in 2011, and learnings from the implementation of autonomous schools approaches in Singapore, Hong Kong, United States, Canada and the United Kingdom, as well as in Western Australia and other Australian jurisdictions. An overview of the evidence base and possible questions is provided in Research on increased autonomy in schools (Attachment 3).

- The Unions have identified a number of industrial issues where the current certified agreements provide guarantees around school based management. The key issue is that the workforce plan that includes a change to the staffing mix in the school will be endorsed by the School Council rather than the central Education Consultative Committee where unions currently have a right of veto.
 - i. The current position is that:
 - Enterprise Bargaining processes are continuing towards finalising replacement of school teachers and core (school based non teaching staff excluding teacher aides and cleaners) certified agreements. The government's proposed replacement agreements will facilitate the implementation of IPS through the removal of matters of policy and impediments to managerial prerogatives. However these current certified agreements continue to apply beyond their normal expiry date until a replacement agreement/determination comes into effect. As such there are industrial obligations arising from the agreement that are highly likely to impede the implementation of the IPS.
 - It is also noted that the teacher aides and school cleaners agreements will continue to embody policy matters and some constraints on managerial prerogatives for the coming three years, having been certified late 2011/early 2012. Departmental officers are meeting with United Voice to seek cooperation in the implementation.

Response:

The flexibility of schools to manage their workforce to meet their student needs is critical to the success of the Independent Public Schools initiative. Schools will engage in broad consultation with their employees with the proposals being considered by the school's workforce consultative committees.

Promotional material

- 4. A range of material has been developed to promote the initiative to Queensland state schools and to explain components to the general public and stakeholders. The range includes:
 - Frequently Asked Questions Fact Sheet a comprehensive list of questions and answers that have been drafted based on issues raised by each of the stakeholders throughout the consultation process (Attachment 4).

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- School Councils Fact Sheet an overview of the composition and role (in accordance with current legislation) of Queensland school councils (Attachment 5).
- Human Resources Fact Sheet an overview of the human resources provisions that will exist in Independent Public Schools (Attachment 6).
- Legislation and policy Fact Sheet a brief overview of the legislative requirements
 that will remain for Independent Public Schools and the interaction of these with
 existing department policy. Independent Public Schools will receive further detailed
 information on this issue as part of the transition process (Attachment ?).

Proposed launch

- 5. The Department is in a position to support the launch date determined by the Minister.
- 6. Officers from Corporate Communications and Marketing have been consulted and will assist with launch and communication strategy.
- 7. It is anticipated the launch of the initiative will attract significant media attention.

Media Pack

A media pack has been prepared for distribution to selected media representatives. It will
consist of the prospectus (Attachment 1), At a glance (Attachment 2), a media Q&A
(Attachment 8), and a press release (Attachment 9).

Letter to the Premier Queensland

A letter to the Premier has been draffed to seek his formal approval of his Foreword in the
prospectus, and to inform him of the aunch on Friday. It is understood that informal
discussions have already occurred with the Premier's office (Attachment 10).

Timelines

- 10. The proposed implementation timelines for *Independent Public Schools* initiative are as follows:
 - a. Thursday 21 June Program launch (expressions of interest open and online material made available)
 - b. Friday 7 September 2012 Expressions of Interest close
 - c. Monday & October 2012 Independent Public Schools announced
 - d. Throughout term 4, 2012 Transition support provided to schools
 - e. (1911) 30 Independent Public Schools commence

Interaction with the Australian Government Empowering Local Schools National Partnership

11. The Australian Government's Schools Empowering Local Schools National Partnership is occurring at a similar time as the Independent Public Schools initiative.

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12. There are some key differences between the two programs, such as:

Background

- 13. The LNP election commitment stated that around 120 State schools could opt to become Independent Public Schools over the next four years, with 30 schools transitioning each year.
- 14. The election commitment cited references to the Western Australian Independent Public Schools program as a successful model upon which to build Queensland's approach.
- 15. In 1996 to 1997, Queensland implemented the Leading Schools program focused on implementing school based management. This program attracted opposition from the Queensland Teachers Union (QTU) due to the perceived inequalities flowing from the perception of a two-tiered schooling system and increased management responsibilities for principals.

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

This Government is committed to getting the basics right and getting Queens and back on track. The best way to do this is to enable the people closest to their communities to make decisions affecting them.



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Maximising possibilities

The Independent Public Schools initiative recognises the best decision making often occurs at a local level through direct response to local community needs and aspirations.

It will reduce red tape, giving schools more opportunities to achieve the best possible outcomes for their students and local communities.

From 2013, 30 Independent Public Schools will have the opportunity to embrace a range of additional autonomies to enable:

- · increased innovation
- · stronger partnerships with industry
- · further tailoring of local school programs.


Queensland is a diverse state with diverse school communities to make Independent Public Schools will have the freedom to be responsive and open to the broader range of possibilities their communities can offer.

Queensland state schools already have a range of autonomies. The *Independent Public Schools* initiative will build on these autonomies.

Autonomies currently available to all Queensland state schools

Queensland state schools can:

- · drive the implementation of the Australian and Queensland Curriculum
- · adopt a range of curricula
- · plan the school's learning program including setting flexible school hours
- · offer differentiated learning programs
- · determine the timing of their student free days
- · determine their staffing with endorsement from local workplace committees
- · recruit non-teaching staff
- select their own deputy principals and heads of department when vacancies occur
- select casual and temporary teachers through departmental processes
- manage minor maintenance and minor capital works projects up to \$100 000
- · manage school utilities and retain savings
- expend the school bank account to a maximum of \$250 000
- sign or vary contracts with procurement approval and dispose of plant and equipment up to the expenditure delegation.





Enhanced local governance

All Independent Public Schools will be required to establish a school council.

School councils will enable greater involvement of the school community and other stakeholders, such as industry, in setting the strategic direction for the school.

School councils will approve and monitor the school's strategic direction, further strengthening collaborative local decision making.

As well as the range of existing autonomies afforded to state schools, *Independent Public Schools* will have additional autonomies over governance and administration. These include:

- · the principal will have a performance agreement with the Director-General
- · an independent review of the school's progress will be based on a four-year cycle

The role of the school council

The school council will:

- · approve strategic plans and policies that set the future direction of the school
- approve other strategic documents such as those relating to school revenue and expenditure
- · monitor the school's strategic direction
- · advise the school's principal about strategic matters
- · approve workforce plans.

Independent Public Schools

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Advancing innovation

By utilising local expertise and responding directly to local community needs, *Independent Public Schools* will be able to embrace enhanced innovation to further maximise student learning outcomes.

Opportunities for innovation

Maximised autonomy will enable *Independent Public Schools* to find exciting new ways to do business. Enhanced innovation will drive improved outcomes for Queensland's students. On offer is:

- a direct line of communication with the Director-General and other senior executives who
 will help prioritise innovation by paving a smooth path through departmental processes
- the freedom to directly recruit staff and to build a team that is fit-for-purpose to drive innovation
- more autonomy to manage and utilise infrastructure, financial resources and human resources
- more autonomy to work in new ways with local businesses, industry and other community organisations
- arroption to pursue creative models of sponsorship, industry partnerships and infrastructure partnerships
- international Baccalaureate programs, extracurricular programs, gateway programs and centres of excellence
- freedom to shape and deliver innovative educational practices that maximise outcomes for students.

Independent Public Schools will use their additional autonomies to enable them to better respond to the unique potential of their students and communities.



Locally tailored workforce

Independent Public Schools will be able to shape their workforce to best meet their school's strategic direction.

Principals of *Independent Public Schools* may develop a workforce plan in consultation with their local workforce committees. This plan will be submitted to the school council for approval.

Independent Public Schools will have additional autonomy to provide greater flexibility in staffing options.

Independent Public Schools will be able to recruit all school staff including classroom teachers (where vacancies exist) without using the department's existing transfer system.

Increased financial flexibility

Independent Public Schools will be able to utilise their full budget, providing them with the flexibility to direct resources to best meet their students' individual needs.

Independent Public Schools will receive a one-line school budget that includes school grants and a staffing budget expressed in both full-time equivalent staff and notional monetary terms.

Building for the future


Independent Public Schools will be able to formulate infrastructure plans and industry links to shape a physical environment that best matches the strategic vision for their school.

Independent Public Schools will:

- have autonomy to participate with local government authorities, industry and community to plan joint facilities
- · have the opportunity to contract and manage their own maintenance using QBuild or contractors
- · develop a Strategic Infrastructure (Assets) Plan in direct consultation with central office
- submit requests for capital works projects directly to central office.

Independent Public Schools

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Public accountability and transparency

As part of Queensland's strong state education system, *Independent Public Schools* will still comply with state legislation, industrial instruments, directives, delegations, whole-of-government policies and national agreements.

While Independent Public Schools will not be required to follow a number of operational procedures, they will be required to operate within the following parameters:

- · participate in an independent review based on a four-year cycle
- · enter into a performance agreement between the principal and the Director-General
- · have an annual performance review
- operate in accordance with United in our Pursuit of Excellence 2011-2015
- · participate in system audits
- provide systemic data and use corporate systems e.g. OneSchool and MyHR
- purchase IT products that are compatible with the department's managed operating environment.

Supporting our Independent Public Schools

Independent Public Schools will receive a one-off \$50 000 grant to assist with their transition. This funding will enable the schools to seek expertise and advice about the establishment and effective functioning of their school council. In addition, schools will be eligible to receive a further \$50 000 in funding each year for administrative purposes following an annual performance review.

Independent Public Schools will continue to be nefit from the strengths of the Queensland state education system through access to:

- · existing liability insurance
- · legal and media advice
- · financial and procurement advice
- · industrial relations advice and support
- · Curriculum into the Classroom
- OneSchool
- MyHR
- Workcover support
- · central and regional office support.

Independent Public Schools

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How to become an Independent Public School

All Queensland state schools can apply to become an Independent Public School by:

- · registering their interest via the Expression of Interest (EOI) Form
- submitting a short written application of no more than three A4 pages with their EOI (see below).

Applications to become an Independent Public School in 2013 close September 2012.

A departmental panel will consider all applications.

Written applications

Schools need to prepare a written application to support their EOI

The application needs to:

- demonstrate broad consultation has occurred with:
 - staff, including the Local Consultative Committee
 - parents, including the Parents & Citizens Association (P&C)
 - the wider community, including local businesses and industry
- . demonstrate the school's capacity to assume greater responsibility for their affairs
- · outline the potential benefits for students and the broader school community
- · outline the innovative educational programs or practices the school will implement.

School staff and relevant community members should be consulted prior to applying. Consultation should occur in a number of ways to ensure the whole school community is engaged and has an opportunity to provide input.

To become an *Independent Public School*, a school council must already exist, or there must be an explicit commitment of establish one.

Future opportunities

There will be a total of 120 Independent Public Schools rolled out across the state over the next four years.

There is a diverse range of communities throughout Queensland and increased independence will not suit everyone.

Not all schools will be in a position to utilise the autonomies on offer from 2013, however many may wish to consider the option of applying in future years.

Further opportunities to express interest to become an *Independent Public School* will be provided each year, with 30 schools to be selected annually.



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Independent Public Schools at a glance

The Independent Public Schools initiative aims to increase autonomy in decision making, cut red tape and remove layers of management to improve outcomes for students.

There will be a total of 120 Independent Public Schools rolled out across the state over the next four years.

Building on the high degree of autonomy already afforded to all Queensland state schools, the key features of *Independent Public Schools* are outlined below.

Enhanced local governance

All Independent Public Schools will be required to establish a school council.

A school council will enable greater involvement of the school community and other stakeholders such as industry in setting the strategic direction for the school.

School councils will approve and monitor the school's strategic direction, strengthening local decision making. Independent Public Schools will be provided with the following additional autonomies over governance and

- the principal will have a performance agreement directly with the Director-General
- there will be an independent review of the school's progress every four years.

Advancing innovation

administration:

By using local expertise and having more freedom to respond to local community needs, *Independent Public Schools* will be able to embrace innovation to maximise student learning outcomes.

Independent Public Schools will have:

- increased autonomy to work in new ways with local businesses, industry and community organisations. This could lead to creative models of sponsorship, industry partnerships and infrastructure partnerships
- increased flexibility to approve curriculum offerings that suit the needs of students e.g. International Baccalaureate programs, extracurricular programs, gateway programs and centres of excellence.

Locally tailored workforce

Independent Public Schools will be able to shape their workforce to meet strategic directions set at a local level that respond directive to the needs of their students.

The principal of an *Independent Public School* may develop workforce plans in consultation with their local workforce committees. The school's workforce plan will be submitted to the school council for approval.

Principals at Independent Public Schools will be able to choose between directly recruiting teachers (where vacancies exist) or filling vacancies through existing internal applicant pools or the transfer and relocation systems.

The transfer system will be retained and strengthened.

Financial flexibility

Independent Public Schools will:

- receive a one-line school budget that includes school grants and a staffing budget expressed in both full-time equivalent (FTE) staff and notional monetary terms
- receive an FTE allocation directly from central office for student support staff, such as support teachers for literacy and numeracy, English as a second language teachers, guidance officers, behaviour management teachers and students with disability support.


Building for the future

Independent Public Schools will:

- be able to plan joint facilities with local councils, industry and community
- have the freedom to contract and manage their own maintenance using QBuild or contractors
- be able to develop and implement a Strategic
 Infrastructure (Assets) Plan directly with central office
- submit requests for capital works projects directly to central office.

Support, accountability and transparency

Independent Public Schools must still comply with state legislation, industrial instruments, directives, delegations, whole-of-government policy and national agreements.



Independent Public Schools will be required to:

- · participate in an independent review every four years
- enter into a performance agreement between the principal and the Director-General
- · have an annual principal performance review
- operate in accordance with United in our Pursuit of Excellence 2011-2015
- · participate in system audits
- provide systemic data and use the department's systems e.g. OneSchool and MyHR
- purchase IT products that are compatible with the department's managed operating environment.

Independent Public Schools will receive a \$50 000 grant to assist with their transition. This funding will enable schools to seek expertise and advice about the establishment and effective functioning of their school council. In addition, schools will be eligible to receive a further \$50 000 in funding each year for administration purposes following an annual performance review.

Independent Public Schools will continue to benefit from the strengths of the Queensland state education system through access to:



Selection process

All Queensland state schools will be able to apply to be selected as an *Independent Public School*. A departmental selection panel will consider all applications. Schools that are in the best position to use the increased autonomy to improve student outcomes will be selected. Additionally, the schools selected will represent the diversity of state schools across Queensland.

Attachment 3 - Research on increased autonomy in schools

Research on the effectiveness of school autonomy is varied. The lack of conclusive evidence arises from the different way in which autonomies are implemented, different contexts in which they are implemented, and the lack of ability to isolate variables such as the nature of the student cohort.

With these constraints in mind, there are some key themes worth noting. They are/

There is evidence that increased autonomy yields increased outcomes in some areas. A large scale study recently conducted by the OECD (2011) found when the conditions are right (such as appropriate accountability), autonomy is associated with better student performance.

There are some variables that appear to be more effective in autonomous schools

Autonomy in implementing curriculum and student assessment has been found to be effective.

Where schools have greater autonomy in resource allocation they can show better student performance than those with less autonomy. However, accountability arrangements are important with respect to resource allocation. Where there are no accountability arrangements, schools with greater autonomy in resource allocation tend to perform worse.

There are some studies that show no positive effect of autonomy

Autonomy may be conducive to student achievement in well-developed systems but detrimental in low-performing systems.

Where there is a lack of accountability, increased autonomy may not yield any improved outcomes.

Autonomy enables schools to respond to the unique mix of student learning needs In his review of school autonomy, Australian researcher Caldwell (2004) reports that it is no longer possible for the needs of schools to be determined at the centre, whether it be for the standard allocation of staff or the determination of how money should be spent on supplies, equipment and services.

The State School Teachers' Union of Western Australia (SSTUWA) commissioned research into autonomous schools that was negative.

The SSTUWA, commissioned an independent study by the Curtin University Graduate School of Business into Independent Public Schools. The study conducted by Dr Scott Fitzgerald and Professor Al Rainnie reported that:

- The drive behind the move is primarily financial, aimed at cutting public sector spending, particularly wage costs;
- There is disturbing evidence from the UK and other parts of Australia that the policy threatens standards of service delivery, as well as terms and conditions of employment of both teachers and principals within the public education system;
- Self-managed schools do not improve student learning outcomes;
- Financial inducements to move to self-managed status rapidly disappear, reinforcing existing inequality within and between schools;
- Principals have increased workloads and are increasingly required to be managers rather than educators;
- The combined drivers of managerialism, marketisation and performance management have led to a decline in the proportion of women in senior management positions, including as principals; and
- Teachers experience corrosion in the culture and character of teaching.

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Possible guestions and answers

Q. If some of the research shows that increased autonomy does not improve outcomes in schools, how can you justify introducing it?

A. We have carefully scanned the research to identify what does work, and what doesn't. What the research does show us is that under the right conditions, increased autonomy can improve schools' responses to student needs.

For example, from a large scale study conducted by the OECD in 2011, we know that autonomy needs to be mixed with accountability. We believe that the *Independent Public Schools* initiative has a good mix of autonomy and accountability. This includes a performance agreement with the Director-General.

We also know that parent and community engagement is a powerful influence on student achievement. Local decision-making strengthens the role of parents and community in the school and forms a valuable partnership. *Independent Public Schools* will be required to establish a school council which will work with school stakeholders to set the strategic direction.

Common sense also prevails. It is clear that for schools to be responsive to the needs of their students and communities, it is important for decisions to be made at a local level, and not at the centre. *Independent Public Schools* is about removing levels of management, cutting red tape and placing the decision making at the local level.

- Q. Studies throughout the world have shown that increased autonomy in schools creates inequality between schools. Why are you introducing a system that fosters inequality?
- A. Experience of autonomous schools initiatives throughout the world indicates that it is important not to create a tiered system within public schools. *Independent Public Schools* aim to ensure that the *Independent Public Schools* are representative of the wide range of schools throughout Queensland (e.g., large, small, metropolitan, regional, low SES, primary, secondary, P-10, special etc.). The schools selected will be those that are in a position to utilise increased autonomy in order to drive improved student outcomes. *Independent Public Schools* will continue to be a part of our strong state schooling system, building upon the excellence already established.
- Q. Why can't all schools be Independent Public Schools?
- A. Queensland state schools already have a great deal of autonomy. This initiative is not designed for all schools in Queensland. This Government is working to reduce red tape and remove layers of bureaucracy for all schools. That work will continue.

This initiative will be focused where it can gain maximum effect. This initiative will be rolled out carefully, with an evaluation conducted in Term 3, 2013.

Q. Studies show that school autonomy creates unrealistic workloads for principals and their staff in terms of red tape and administration

A. Independent Public Schools will have access to support from central and regional office where required. They will also continue to have access to: the existing transfer system; existing liability insurance; legal and media advice; financial and procurement advice; human resources and industrial relations advice; OneSchool; MyHR; Workcover support etc.

The Independent Public Schools initiative will not suit every school, however, there are many who seek greater autonomy and the opportunity to work innovatively to meet the needs of their students.

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- Q. Studies show that school autonomy fails where there are financial inducements to choose less experienced staff or reduce staff
- A. That's why *Independent Public Schools* will not be required to manage the actual human resources salary budget and therefore, the actual salaries will not have any bearing on staffing decisions. The *Independent Public Schools* initiative is not aimed at cost saving. It is aimed at supporting schools to be more centred on the needs of their students and their local community.
- Q. The autonomy to directly recruit teachers will undermine the quality of the workforce in other schools, particularly in remote and isolated schools where it is already hard to recruit teachers
- A. Schools benefit when staff have security of employment combined with the flexibility to mix staff in a way that meets the specific needs of their cohort of students. That's why the Independent Public Schools initiative provides schools with the autonomy to recruit their own teachers without going through the department's transfer or relocation processes. However Independent Public Schools will also have access to the department's recruitment and transfer processes should they choose to use them. The goal is to provide maximum flexibility, whilst ensuring that all Queensland schools have access to a strong teaching workforce.
- Q. This system hasn't worked in other states. What is being done to avoid the pitfalls that others have experienced?
- A. The implementation of the *Independent Public Schools* will be closely monitored. An evaluation will be conducted to identify the strengths and weaknesses of the initiative, and to recognise any improvements that can be made. The first phase of the evaluation will be conducted in third term 2013. This will inform the roll-out of the next 30 *Independent Public Schools* in 2014.
- Q. A study was conducted of the Western Australia model, and it found that the Independent Public Schools had detrimental effects. Given that the Queensland initiative is modelled on Western Australia, how will Queensland mitigate against these outcomes?
- A. The Queensland *Independent Public Schools* model has been developed following analysis of the elements from Western Australia as well as other Australian and international experiences. We have learnt from the mistakes of others and have built our model to avoid these pitfalls.


Queensland is seeking to stake the right balance of autonomy through the *Independent Public Schools* initiative – this may differ from school to school, depending on a range of factors, such as collective capability and the student and community needs.

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Independent Public Schools – Questions and answers

How will Queensland *Independent Public* Schools differ from other state schools?

Queensland's state schools already have a good deal of autonomy. *Independent Public Schools* will be provided with an opportunity for greater involvement of their school community in scoping their strategic direction to embrace innovation and tailor school programs to meet the individual needs of their community.

How can schools become an Independent Public School?

All Queensland state schools will be invited to become an *Independent Public School* through an open Expression of Interest (EOI) process. It will be important for schools to have the support of their school community in submitting their application.

The application needs to:

- · demonstrate broad consultation has occurred with:
 - staff, including the Local Consultative Committee
 - parents, including the Parents & Citizens (P&C)
 Association
 - the wider community, including local business and industry
- demonstrate the school's capacity to assume greater responsibility for their affairs
- outline the potential benefits for students and the broader school community.
- outline the innovative educational programs or practices the school will implement.

How will schools be involved in the initiative?

A departmental selection panel will consider all applications. Schools that are in the best position to use increased autonomy to improve student outcomes will be selected. Additionally, the schools selected will represent the diversity of state schools across Queensland.

How many schools will be involved?

Up to 30 Independent Public Schools will be selected to commence in 2013. A total of 120 Independent Public

Schools will be involved in the initiative – 30 each year from 2013 to 2016.

What will school governance look like in an Independent Public School?

Independent Fublic Schools will be required to have a school council. This will enable greater involvement of the school community in setting the strategic direction of the school. School councils will inform and monitor the school's strategic direction, strengthening local decision making. In addition, principals will have a performance agreement with the Director-General.

How will staffing processes differ for Independent Public Schools?


Principals at *Independent Public Schools* will be able to choose between directly recruiting teachers (where vacancies exist) or by filling vacancies through existing department applicant pools or the transfer system. Principals at *Independent Public Schools* will also be able to recruit classified teachers without having to go through the relocation process.

Will Independent Public Schools have to follow departmental policies?

While Independent Public Schools will not be required to follow a number of operational procedures, they will be required to operate within legislation, industrial instruments, directives, delegations, whole-of-government policy and national agreements.

What autonomies will be on offer to Independent Public Schools?

Independent Public Schools will have the freedom to directly recruit teachers and to build a team that is able to shape and deliver innovative educational practices. They will also have more autonomy to manage and utilise infrastructure and financial resources. Independent Public Schools will have a direct line of communication with the Director-General and other senior executives who will cut red tape and help prioritise innovation.





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Independent Public Schools – Queensland school councils

Under the Education (General Provisions) Act 2006 the chief executive may establish a school council for a state school.

Composition

- The number of members of a school council must be at least six and not more than 15.
- · A school council must include at least:
 - one elected parent member
 - one elected staff member (the number of elected parent members and elected staff members of a school council must be equal).
- · A school council must include not more than:
 - two elected student members
 - two appointed members.
- · A school council must include at least:
 - one elected student member (if the state school provides Years 10, 11 or 12).
- . The official members of a school council are
 - the school's principal
 - the Parents & Citizens' (P&C) Association president.

All members of a student council (except co-opted student members – that is students not in lears 10, 11 or 12) are able to vote at council meetings.

Chairperson

A school council must electione of the council's members as chairperson of the council. The school's principal may not be elected as chairperson, however the president of the P&C is eligible.

Functions

The role of a school council is to:

- · Monitor the school's strategic direction.
- Approve:
 - plans and policies of the school of a strategic nature
 - other documents affecting strategic matters, including the annual estimate of revenue and expenditure for the school.

- Monitor the implementation of the plans, policies and other documents mentioned above.
- · Advise the school's principal about strategic matters.

The council must perform its functions in a way that achieves the best learning outcomes for the school's students.

Term of office

- Each elected member, or appointed member, of a school council holds office for the term, not longer than two years, stated in the council's constitution.
- However, if newly established, the council's constitution may provide for half of the first elected members to hold office for a term of not longer than three years.

Meetings

- A school council must meet at least twice in each semester.
- The school council's chairperson must preside at all council meetings at which the chairperson is present.
- A question at a school council meeting, other than a question about an amendment of the council's constitution, must be decided by a majority of the votes of the council members present.

Legal accountabilities

 A member of a school council does not incur civil liability for an act done, or omission made, honestly and without negligence under the Education (General Provisions) Act 2006.

Role of the P&C

- School councils will have the responsibility to approve the strategic documents that set the direction, culture and tone of the school. The P&C president will be on the school council to represent the views of the P&C Association.
- The Independent Public Schools initiative will not have any impact on the functions of P&Cs.



Out-of-scope

A school council cannot:

- Interfere with management by the school's principal of day-to-day operations of the school and its curriculum.
- Make operational decisions about the use of teaching or learning resources at the school.
- Make decisions about the individual teaching style used, or to be used, at the school.
- Make a decision that is contrary to law or a written policy of the department.
- · Have control of funds.
- · Enter into contracts.
- · Acquire, hold, dispose of or deal with property.
- · Sue or be sued.
- · Establish a committee or subcommittee.



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Independent Public Schools – human resources

Staff management

- Independent Public Schools will be directly allocated their primary, secondary and Special School resources as well as student support resourcing such as behaviour management, support teachers for literacy and numeracy, English as a second language, students with disability support and guidance officers.
- Employees at Independent Public Schools retain their leave entitlements (e.g. sick leave, long service leave and recreation leave) and the same conditions of employment as employees at all other state schools.
- Independent Public Schools will manage the return from extended leave of employees based at their school.
- Independent Public Schools will continue to manage short-term teacher absences as per the current Teacher Relief Scheme management system.
- The Independent Public Schools initiative will not impact upon permanency. If permanent staff do not wish to remain in an Independent Public School, they will be required to provide notification within one month of the school being advised it will be included in the Independent Public Schools initiative. Teachers will have the opportunity to transfer to another state school within the same geographic area.
- Permanent non-teaching employees will remain at their current location until a permanent position at a new location is found.

Recruitment and selection


- Independent Public Schools will have the opportunity to recruit all teachers without going through departmental processes. Independent Public Schools can also continue to use the current recruitment and transfer systems.
- Principals of Independent Public Schools will continue to follow the current processes to manage unsatisfactory performance of staff.
- The transfer system will be retained and strengthened for all state schools.
- The transfer system will continue to be available for teachers at *Independent Public Schools* who wish to apply for a transfer to other locations.

Staffing profile

- Independent Public Schools will have the capacity to plan their workforce (administrative staff, teaching staff and school support staff). There will need to be a strong consultative process when developing a proposal. The workforce plan will be approved by the school council.
- Independent Public Schools will not be managing an actual salary budget i.e. the actual salaries of teachers have no impact on staffing decisions.
- Independent Public Schools will be provided with a one-line school budget that includes school grants and a staffing budget expressed in both full-time equivalent (FTE) staff and notional monetary terms. The notional FTE budget will be based on average salary costs. This will facilitate the capacity of the schools to determine the appropriate staffing mix during workforce planning.
- Independent Public Schools will have the same staffing entitlement as all other state schools. There will be no difference in respect to permanent and temporary positions.
- Local workforce committees will continue to operate to ensure a strong local consultative process in Independent Public Schools.

Principal positions

- A school will be selected to become an *Independent Public School*, rather than a principal. The principal will not have a contract. The conditions and tenure of principals will not be affected by the *Independent Public Schools* initiative.
- The Independent Public Schools initiative will not impact on the banding of the principal position or the principal's capacity to apply for a relocation or promotion.
- The selection of a new principal of an Independent Public School will follow the current system-wide process for the appointment of Executive Principals. The only difference will be that the school council chair will be included on the selection panel.






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Independent Public Schools – legislative and policy requirements

While Independent Public Schools will not be required to follow a number of operational procedures, they will be required to operate within legislation, industrial instruments, directives, delegations, whole-of-government policy and national agreements.

Policies and procedures

Queensland state schools have a range of procedures that are published on the department's *Procedure Register* www.education.qld.gov.au/strategic/eppr/index.html. The majority of these procedures are based on guiding legislation, such as the *Education (General Provisions) Act 2006* or *Education (General Provisions) Regulation 2006*, however the procedures generally provide more detail and prescription of responsibilities aimed at assisting school decision making and operation.

Independent Public Schools will still operate within the bounds of legislation but will have the flexibility to determine local approaches if desired, and as appropriate.

Education legislation

The most significant pieces of guiding legislation for Queensland schools are the Education (General Provisions) Act 2006 (the Act) www.legislation_qid.gov.au/LEGISLTN/ACTS/2006/06AC039.pdf and the Education (General Provisions) Regulation 2006
www.legislation.qld.gov.au/LEGISLTN/CURRENT/E/EducGenPrR06.pdf. The Act sets out the conditions and requirements for the provision of education to children and young people in Queensland. A number of the powers or

conditions set out in the act refer to decisions that can only be made by the Minister or the Director-General, for example the power to establish or change the name of a state school.

However, there are also many sections of the Act that place conditions on the daily operation of Queensland state schools (including *Independent Public Schools*), for example, in relation to enrolment processes, mature age students, applying fees and charges, religious instruction, school councils and parents & citizens' associations.

Other legislation


There are aspects of other state and national legislation that place conditions on the operation of Queensland state schools. For instance, legislation that impacts on privacy, information sharing, anti-discrimination, workplace health and safety and financial management, to name a few.

Support for schools

Independent Public Schools will be provided with access to professional development materials to assist with understanding their ongoing legislative requirements. Independent Public Schools wishing to design local policies and procedures will have access to support from central office to ensure local approaches remain compliant with existing legislation, industrial instruments, directives, delegations, whole-of-government policy and national agreements.

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Independent Public Schools – Frequently Asked Questions

How will Queensland Independent Public Schools differ from other state schools?

Queensland's state schools already have a good deal of autonomy. *Independent Public Schools* will be provided with an opportunity for greater involvement of their school community in scoping their strategic direction to embrace innovation and tailor school programs to meet the individual needs of their community.

How can schools become an *Independent Public School?*

All Queensland state schools will be invited to become an *Independent Public School* through an open Expression of Interest (EOI) process. It will be important for schools to have the support of their school community in submitting their application.

Schools need to prepare a written application to support their EOI.

The application needs to:

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- · demonstrate broad consultation has occurred with:
 - staff, including the Local Consultative Committee
 - parents, including the Parents & Citizens' (P&C)
 Association
 - the wider community, including local business and industry
- demonstrate the school's capacity to assume greater responsibility for their affairs)
- outline the potential benefits for students and the broader school community.
- outline the innovative educational programs or practices the school will implement.

How will schools be involved in the initiative?

A departmental selection panel will consider all applications. Schools that are in the best position to use increased autonomy to improve student outcomes will be selected. Additionally, the schools selected will represent the diversity of state schools across Queensland.

Schools that have already been identified to participate in the *Empowering Local Schools National Partnership* program will still be able to apply to become an

Independent Public School. Should they be selected, they will shift to the Independent Public Schools initiative, and a replacement school for the Empowering Local Schools National Partnership program will be identified.

How many schools will be involved?

Up to 30 Independent Public Schools will be selected to commence in 2013. A total of 120 Independent Public Schools will be involved in the initiative – 30 each year from 2013 to 2016.

What will school governance look like in an independent Public School?

Independent Public Schools will be required to have a school council. This will enable greater involvement of the school community in setting the strategic direction of the school. School councils will inform and monitor the school's strategic direction, strengthening local decision making.

In addition, principals will have a performance agreement with the Director-General.

Will Independent Public Schools be funded differently?


Independent Public Schools will receive \$50 000 to assist in the change. In addition, schools will be eligible to receive a further \$50 000 in funding each year for administrative purposes.

All other funding amounts will remain the same; however Independent Public Schools will be provided with a one-line school budget that includes school grants and a staffing budget expressed in both full-time equivalent staff and notional monetary terms.

How will staffing processes differ for Independent Public Schools?

Principals at Independent Public Schools will be able to choose between directly recruiting teachers (where vacancies exist) or by filling vacancies through existing department applicant pools or the transfer system.

Principals at Independent Public Schools will also be able



to recruit classified teachers without having to go through the relocation process.

Independent Public Schools may choose to undertake workforce planning to determine their staffing mix. Local workforce committees will continue to operate to ensure a strong local consultative process, and the final workforce plan will be approved by the school council.

The Independent Public School initiative will not impact upon permanency of staff. If a permanent employee does not wish to remain in an Independent Public School, the employee will have the opportunity to transfer to another state school within the same geographic area.

All permanent employees will be required to confirm in writing if they are opting out from their school within one month of the notification that the school will be included in the *Independent Public Schools* initiative. Teaching staff will be managed within the current teacher transfer process. Non-teaching employees will remain at their current location until a permanent position at a new location is found through the normal relocation processes of the department. Transfers will only be considered within the employee's current geographical area.

The transfer system will continue to be available for teachers at *Independent Public Schools* who wish to apply for a transfer to other locations.

Will the transfer system be affected?

The transfer system will be retained and strengthened for all Queensland state schools.

How will the management of school facilities differ for Independent Public Schools?

Independent Public Schools will have the opportunity to participate with local councils, industry and community to plan joint facilities. In addition, Independent Public Schools will be able to submit requests for capital works directly to central office and will have the opportunity to develop and implement their Strategic Infrastructure (Assets) Plan directly with central office

Independent Public Schools will also be able to contract and manage their maintenance using QBuild or contractors.

There will be no change to the level of funding for facilities provided to independent Public Schools.

How will principals of *Independent Public* Schools be affected?

Principals of Independent Public Schools will be employed under existing conditions. This means they will still be able to apply for relocations or promotions through existing processes. The Independent Public Schools initiative will not impact on the banding of the principal position.

The selection of a new principal of an Independent Public School will follow the current statewide process for the appointment of Executive Principals. The only difference will be that the school council chair will be included on the selection panel.

How will Independent Public Schools remain accountable?

As part of Queensland's strong state education system, Independent Public Schools will be required to comply with all national and state legislation, industrial instruments, directives, delegations, whole-of-government policy and national agreements. They will also be required to participate in all departmental audits.

For Independent Public Schools, a school review will be conducted independently every four years.

Accountabilities and targets for principals will be negotiated through a performance agreement with the Director-General and monitored through annual performance discussions.

What will be included in a principal's performance agreement?

The agreed outcomes and their indicators of achievement for each *Independent Public School* will be identified in a performance agreement between the principal and the Director-General.

The agreement will include the key priorities for the school, such as student and school performance and workforce planning, effectiveness of governance arrangements, compliance, leadership development, resourcing and support and reporting against school plans.

The school's four-year strategic plan and annual implementation plan will have the same elements as currently required under the *School Planning*, *Reviewing and Reporting Framework 2012-2015*, with all school plans being approved by the school council.



What will the annual performance review involve?

The annual performance review will be a conversation between the *Independent Public School* principal and a delegate of the Director-General, based on the agreed outcomes and measures identified in the performance agreement.

Will Independent Public Schools have to follow departmental policies?

While Independent Public Schools will not be required to follow a number of operational procedures, they will be required to operate within legislation, industrial instruments, directives, delegations, whole-of-government policy and national agreements.

Further information can be found in the Legislative and Policy Requirements Fact Sheet.

Will Independent Public Schools deliver the same curriculum?

Within a curriculum framework approved by the Minister, Independent Public School principals will be able to plan the learning experiences offered to students at a school. This means continuing to implement the Australian Curriculum, the Queensland Studies Authority syllabuses and mandatory languages other than English in Years 6, 7 and 3.

Will enrolment processes differ for Independent Public Schools?

Independent Public Schools will continue to manage their enrolments within existing capacity and enrolment management plans. Special School principals involved in the Independent Public Schools initiative will make decisions regarding the enrolment of students at their school.

Will Independent Public Schools be able to charge additional fees?

Independent Public Schools will continue to determine student resource scheme amounts, voluntary contributions or to set fees for specialised programs.

Will Independent Public Schools be able to change their name?

Independent Public Schools will not be able to rename their school. The authority to change the name of a state school remains with the Minister.



What support will be provided to Independent Public Schools?

Independent Public Schools will receive a \$50 000 grant to assist with their transition. This funding will enable schools to seek expertise and advice about the establishment and effective functioning of their school council. In addition, schools will receive a further \$50 000 in funding each year.

Independent Public Schools will continue to benefit from the strengths of the Queensland state education system through access to:

- · existing liability insurance
- · legal and media advice
- · financial and purchasing advice
- · industrial relations advice and support
- · Curriculominto the Classroom
- · OneSchool
- · MyHR
- · Workcover support
- · central and regional office support.

How will school councils operate?

School councils in *Independent Public Schools* will operate under the existing legislation as applied to all state schools. The establishment of school councils will allow greater involvement of the school community in determining the school's strategic direction.

School councils will comprise at least six, but not more than 15 members. A school council must include at least one elected parent member and one elected staff member (the number of elected parent members and elected staff members of a school council must be equal).

A school council (for a school that provides Years 10, 11 and 12) must include at least one but not more than two elected student members and two appointed members. Elected student members can only be students from Year 10, 11 or 12 at the school. Schools may appoint coopted students from younger year levels, however these students are unable to vote.

In general, the school council will play a role in monitoring and informing the school's strategic direction in a way that achieves the best learning outcomes for the school's students. The size of the school will determine representation of staff and students on the school council.

How will the role of a school council differ to that of a P&C?

The *Independent Public Schools* initiative will not have any impact on the functions of P&Cs.

School councils will have the responsibility to approve documents that set the strategic direction of the school, but will not be involved in daily operational aspects. The P&C president will be included on the school council to represent the views of the P&C Association.

Is the Independent Public Schools initiative supported by research?

Research on this subject shows that the success of school autonomy relies on a range of factors such as what support is provided, types of autonomy, accountabilities, etc. However, research also shows that while there should not be a 'one-size fits all' model for autonomy, there is a link between principal autonomy and school effectiveness. In addition, a recent study by the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development reports that a combination of autonomy and accountability is related to better student outcomes.

The level of autonomy required by schools is dependent on a complex mix of variables such as community aspiration, student cohort, geography, etc. The increased level of autonomy that will be offered by the *Independent Public Schools* initiative has the potential to enable local solutions for better learning and ultimately, improving student outcomes.

Will the Independent Public Schools initiative be evaluated?

The implementation of the *Independent Public Schools* initiative will be closely monitored. An evaluation will be conducted to identify the strengths and weaknesses of the initiative, and to ensure that any epportunities for improvement are identified. The first phase of the evaluation – to be conducted in Term Three, 2013 – will

inform the roll-out of the next 30 *Independent Public Schools* in 2014.

What is the difference between the Queensland Government's Independent Public Schools initiative and the Australian Government's Empowering Local Schools National Partnership program?

While the Independent Public Schools initiative and the Empowering Local Schools National Partnership program both recognise the benefits of increasing local decision making and principal autonomy, they are different. The Queensland Government's Independent Public Schools initiative will provide selected schools with a range of additional autonomies, whereas the Empowering Local Schools National Partnership program will drive system reforms to improve community engagement and local decision making for all Queensland state schools.

Independent Public Schools will receive \$50 000 as a transitional grant to assist in the change, and then a further \$50 000 in funding each year for administrative purposes.

Schools selected under the Empowering Local Schools National Partnership program will receive a one-off \$40 000 – \$50 000 grant to implement local strategies that will inform how the department can increase autonomy across the system resulting in improved student outcomes and community engagement.


In addition, some of the schools involved in the Empowering Local Schools National Partnership program will be invited to form a guiding coalition to work with the department to advise on system reforms to reduce red tape and enable greater local autonomy for all Queensland state schools.

The Empowering Local Schools National Partnership program will commence in Semester 2, 2012 and the Independent Public Schools initiative will commence in 2013.

INDEPENDENT PUBLIC SCHOOLS SET TO COMMENCE IN 2013

Education Minister John-Paul Langbroek today moved to give state schools greater autonomy and slash red tape by introducing up to 30 Independent Public Schools next year.

"This initiative, which delivers on our election commitment to lift education standards by allowing schools more control over their decision making, will be extended to 120 schools during the next four years," Mr Langbroek said.

Launching a prospectus inviting all state schools to apply to be among the first independent Public Schools, Mr Langbroek said the selection process would ensure representation for both regional and metropolitan schools.

"This initiative will increase autonomy in decision making, cut red tape and remove layers of management to improve outcomes for students.

"Independent Public Schools will have the freedom to directly recruit teachers and to build a team that is able to deliver innovative educational practices and have more autonomy to manage infrastructure and financial resources.

"We've done our homework and borrowed from the best examples of autonomous schools across Australia and in countries including Singapore, Hong Kong, Canada, the US and the UK...

"Research tells us that parent and community engagement with schools can have a powerful impact on student achievement.

"Participating schools will be required to establish a school council through which the principal and staff can work with parents and the community to make local decisions about issues impacting on school performance and community."



BACKGROUND

- 1. On 18 September the Government announced 26 schools which have been accepted into Round for the Independent Public Schools initiative and will become Independent Public Schools from 2013.
- It is expected that a total of 120 Independent Public Schools will be involved in the initiative — around 30 each year from 2013 to 2016.
- 3. A key element of the Independent Public School initiative is the commitment to give local communities a greater say in decision making.
- 4. All Independent Public Schools are required to establish a school council to enable greater involvement of the school community and other stakeholders, such as industry, in setting the strategic direction for the school.

KEY ISSUES

 A model school council constitution has been drafted, in conjunction with the Legal and Administrative Law Branch, as provided for under section 96 of the Education (General Provisions) Act 2006.

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Date brief completed by Action Officer: 21/09/2012

- The model constitution includes elements such as the composition of the council, eligibility for election or appointment, procedures for election or appointment, terms of office and other pertinent information which will support a school council to be established and run effectively.
- 7. A procedure has also been developed to step out the constitution.
- Further supporting materials can continue to be developed and added to the procedure.
- It is proposed that the Dissolution of School Councils procedure be decommissioned, as this process will be included in the overarching School Council procedure.

CONSULTATION

- All Independent Public School principals have had the opportunity to provide feedback on the procedure and associated materials, including the model constitution. Comments received were complementary.
- 11. The principal associations and P&Cs Queensland have been consulted on the School Council and P&C codes of conduct.
- 12. The Legal and Administrative Law Branch have provided in-depth feedback on all documents, with all issues resolved.

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Preamble

The Education (General Provisions)Act 2006 (Qld)(the "Act") provides for the establishment and operation of school councils for State schools with the object of improving student learning outcomes.

The Act states that school councils must have a constitution. The Chief Executive has prepared this model constitution, including elements required under the Act, as well as additional matters.

The Chief Executive may establish a school council for a State school by notice in the gazette.

Functions and powers

 - a) interfere with the management by the school's principal of the day-to-day operations of the school and its curriculum; or
 - make operational decisions about the use of teaching or learning resources at the school; or
 - c) make decisions about the individual teaching style used, or to be used, at the school; or
 - d) make a decision that is contrary to law or a written policy of the department; or
 - e) have control of funds; or
 - f) enter into contracts; or
 - g) acquire, hold, dispose of or deal with property; or

- h) sue or be sued.
- 2.6 For the avoidance of doubt, the school councilis not part of the department, is not a body corporate and does not have a separate legal identity.

Starting up

3 Establishment of School Council

- 3.1 The school councilis established by the Chief Executive by placing a notice establishing the school council in the gazette.
- 3.2 For detail regarding initial establishment of a school council, refer to Schedule 2.

Membership and Officers

4 Members of the School Council

- 4.1 The school councilmust have at least 6 and not more than 15members comprising:
 - a) the principal as an official member;
 - the president of the Parents and Citizens' Association (if one exists) as an official member;
 - c) at least 1 elected parent member and the same number of elected staff members;
 - d) not more than 2 appointed members;
 - e) at least 1 and not more than 2 elected student members, if the school provides secondary education for year 10, 11 or 12; and
 - f) a maximum of 1cooptedstudent member if the school is a primary school.

5 Official Members

- 5.1 The school council's official members are:
 - a) the principal; and
 - b) the president of the Parents and Citizens' Association (if one exists).
- 5.2 The president of the Parents and Citizens' Associationmayappoint another Parents and Citizens' Association member (the "alternative Parents and Citizens' Association member") to attend meetings of the school council when the president cannot attend the meetings, provided that:
 - a) the president is permitted to appoint an alternative Parents and Citizens' Association member under the Parents and Citizens' Association's constitution;
 - the alternative Parents and Citizens' Association member is not an elected member or appointed member of the school council; and
 - the president gives notice to the chairperson as set out in clause 5.3.
- 5.3 If the president of the Parents and Citizens' Association has appointed an alternative Parents and Citizens' Association member, the president must give the chairperson written notice of:

- a) the alternative Parents and Citizens' Association member's name and address; and
- the date on which the alternative Parents and Citizens' Association member's appointment starts and ends.
- 5.4 The notice must be given to the chairperson at least two days before the day of the first meeting after the alternative Parents and Citizens' Association member's appointment starts.
- 5.5 Despite start and end dates stated in the notice, the president may attend any meeting in the place of and instead of the alternative Parents and Citizens' Association member.
- 5.6 When attending a meeting of the council, the alternative Parents and Citizens' Association member has the same rights and duties as the president.
- 5.7 If the president revokes the appointment of an alternative Parents and Citizens' Association member, the president must give the chairperson written notice of the date of the revocation at least two days before the day of the next meeting following revocation.

6 Elected Parent Members

- 6.1 To be eligible for election as an elected parent member, a person must:
 - a) not be an official member;
 - b) not have been convicted of an indictable offence, unless the Minister gives approval under the Act;
 - c) attend a meeting called for the purpose of electing parent members;
 - d) be the parent of a child attending the school; and
 - e) submit a nomination in accordance with the election procedures described at Schedule 3.
- 6.2 A person is eligible to vote for an elected parent member if that person is eligible to be elected as an elected parent member.
- 6.3 Each elected parent member holds office for a term, not longer than two years, determined by the school council prior to conducting the election for that member.

7 Elected Staff Members

- 7.1 To be eligible for election as an elected staff member, a person must:
 - a) not be an official member;
 - not have been convicted of an indictable offence, unless the Minister gives approval under the Act;
 - attend a meeting called for the purpose of electing staff members;
 - d) be a member of staff of the school; and
 - e) submit a nomination in accordance with the election procedures described at Schedule
 3.
- 7.2 A person is eligible to vote for an elected staff member if that person is eligible to be elected as an elected staff member.

- 7.3 When 2 or more staff members are included in the composition of the school council, this must include 1 teaching staff member and 1 non-teaching staff member.
- 7.4 Each elected staffmember holds office for a term, not longer than two years, determined by the school council prior to conducting the election for that member.

8 Elected Student Members

- 8.1 To be eligible for election as an elected student member, a person must;
 - a) not have been convicted of an indictable offence, unless the Minister gives an approval under the Act;
 - b) be present for an election called for the purpose of electing student members;
 - c) be a student attending year 10, 11 or 12 of the school; and
 - d) submit a nomination in accordance with the election procedures described at Schedule 3.
- 8.2 A person is eligible to vote for an elected studentmember if that person is eligible to be elected as an elected student member.
- 8.3 The term of office for an elected student members
 - a) starts on a day determined by the school councilprior to conducting the election for that member; and
 - b) ends at the conclusion of the calendar year in which the student is elected.

9 Term of Office for First Elected Members

- 9.1 Notwithstanding clauses 6.3, 7.4 and 8.3, and subject to clause 4.1, the following number of the council's first elected members may hold office for a term of not longer than 3 years:
 - a) if one-half of the number of the first elected members is an even number, then one-half of the number of the first elected members;
 - b) if one-half of the number of the first elected members is an odd number, then the whole number next higher than one-half of the number of the first elected members.

10 Appointed Members

- 10.1 To be eligible for appointment as an appointed member, a person must:
 - a) not already be a member of the school council;
 - not have been convicted of an indictable offence, unless the Minister gives approval under the Act;
 - have knowledge and experience that would assist the school council to perform its functions; and
 - d) reflect the local community context.
- 10.2 The official and elected members present at a meeting of the school council may decide:
 - a) who is to be asked to become an appointed member; or
 - to seek nominations from persons wishing to become an appointed member, before deciding who is to be asked to become an appointed member.

- 10.3 A person becomes an appointed member of the school council if:
 - a) the school council asks the person to become an appointed member;
 - b) the person agrees to become an appointed member; and
 - c) the school council makes a decision to appoint the person at a school council meeting.
- 10.4 Each appointed member holds office for a term, not longer than two years, determined by the school council prior to deciding to appoint a person as an appointed member.

11 Coopted Student Member

- 11.1 A school council established at a primary school may choose to coopt a year 7 student as a member of the school council.
- 11.2 The term of office for a coopted student member:
 - a) starts on a day determined by the school council prior to the student being coopted;
 and
 - b) ends at the conclusion of the calendar year in which the student is coopted.

12 Dispute Resolution

- 12.1 The school council must endeavour to work together, with their community and with their school, in an open and collaborative manner.
- 12.2 If a dispute arises, the chairperson should lead a process acting as a facilitator to resolve the dispute through mediation.
- 12.3 If the chairperson is involved in the dispute, the principal should lead dispute resolution process.
- 12.4 If both the principal and the chairperson are involved in the dispute, a written request for mediation should be submitted to the principal's supervisor.

13 Vacancies

- 13.1 The office of an elected or appointed memberbecomes vacant if the member:
 - a) dies; or
 - b) resigns the member's office by signed notice of resignation:
 - i) for the school council 's chairperson given to the school principal's supervisor; or
 - ii) for another school council member given to the school council 's chairperson; or
 - c) is absent from 3 consecutive meetings of the school council, of which the member has been given notice, without the school council's leave and without reasonable excuse; or
 - d) stops being eligible, under the Act or this constitution, for election or appointment to the office.

- 13.2 If a vacancy occurs in the office of an elected or appointed member during the currency of the member's term of office, another person must be elected or appointed to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the vacating member's term.
- 13.3 If the office of an elected or appointed member of a school council is vacant and, because of the vacancy, the membership does not comply with clause 4, the school council is taken to be validly constituted until the earlier of the following:
 - a) the day the vacancy is filled;
 - b) the expiry of 3 months after the day the vacancy arose.

14 Chairperson

- 14.1 The school council must elect one of the members as chairperson.
- 14.2 To be eligible for election as the chairperson, a person must:
 - a) be a member of the school council;
 - b) not be a coopted student member; and
 - c) not be the principal.
- 14.3 Thechairperson holds office for the term decided by the school council, unless the person's term of office as a member of the school councilends sooner than the chairperson's term.
- 14.4 The school council must elect the chairperson in accordance with the guidelines at Schedule 3.

15 Secretary

- 15.1 Thecouncil must elect one of the members as secretary of the school council.
- 15.2 To be eligible for election as the secretary, a person must:
 - a) be a member of the school council;
 - b) not be a coopted student member; and
 - c) not be the principal
- 15.3 The school council must elect the secretary in accordance with the guidelines at Schedule

16 Disclosure of interest

- 16.1 This section applies to a member of theschool council (the interested member) if:
 - a) the interested member has a direct or indirect financial interest in an issue being considered, or about to be considered, by the school council; and
 - the interest could conflict with the proper performance of the interested member's duties when considering the issue.
- 16.2 As soon as practicable after the relevant facts come to the interested member's knowledge, the interested member must disclose the nature of the interest to a meeting of the school council.

- 16.3 Unless the school council otherwise directs, the interested member must not:
 - a) be present when the school council considers the issue; or
 - b) take part in a decision of the school council about the issue.
- 16.4 No interested member maybe present when the school council is considering whether the interested member can be a party to considerations.
- 16.5 If a member is not present at a school council meeting due to their disclosure of interest, and because of this absence the school council is one person less than required to meet the quorum requirements, quorum is deemed to have been met.
- 16.6 A disclosure under clause 16.2 must be recorded in the school council's minutes.

17 Disclosure of indictable offence

- 17.1 If a person is convicted of an indictable offence while a member of a school council, the person must give written notice to the principal of the conviction within 7 days after the conviction.
- 17.2 If an elected member or appointed member is convicted of an indictable offence, then that member's office becomes vacant in accordance with clause 13.1d).

18 Comply with Code of Conduct

18.1 School council members mustcomply with the code of conductapproved by the Chief Executive.

19 Conduct of business

- 19.1 Subject to this constitution and the Act, theschool councilmay conduct its business, including its meetings, in the way it considers appropriate.
- 19.2 However, the school council may only make decisions about how it will carry out its functions if it does so at a school council meeting at which a quorum is present.

20 Time and place of meetings

- 20.1 A school council must meet at least twice in each semester.
- 20.2 School council meetings are at the times and places the school council decides.
- 20.3 However, a school council's chairperson:
 - a) may call a meeting at any time; and
 - must call a meeting if asked, in writing, to do so by the Minister, the chief executive, principal or at least the number of its members required to form a quorum for the school council.

- 20.4 The chairperson must, where possible, give written notice of the time and place of a meeting of the school council to each of the members at least 7 days before the day of the meeting.
- 20.5 A member who is permitted by the school council to take part in such a meeting is taken to be present at the meeting.
- 20.6 The school council may decide that any meeting or part of a meeting may be closed to observers.

21 Quorum

- 21.1 A quorum for a school council is the number equal to two-thirds of the number of its members or, if two-thirds is not a whole number, the next highest whole number.
- 21.2 If the quorum is not present within 30 minutes after the advertised starting time of a school council meeting, the meeting must be adjourned to a time and place decided by the chairperson and notified to the members of the school council in accordance with clause Error! Reference source not found.

22 Presiding at meetings

- 22.1 The school council's chairperson must preside at all council meetings at which the chairperson is present.
- 22.2 If the chairperson is absent from a school council meeting, another school council member chosen by the school council members present must preside.
- 22.3 An alternative Parents and Citizens Association member may not preside at a meeting, unless they are the elected chairperson under clause 22.2.
- 22.4 A coopted student member may not preside at a school council meeting.

23 Conduct of meetings

- 23.1 A question at a school council meeting, other than a question about an amendment of the school council's constitution, must be decided by a majority of the votes of the school council members present.
- 23.2 Each member present at a school council meeting has a vote on each question to be decided and, if the votes are equal, the member presiding has a casting vote.
- 23.3 A member present at a school council meeting who abstains from voting is taken to have voted for the negative.
- 23.4 A school council may hold meetings, or allow its members to take part in its meetings, by telephone, web-conference or another form of communication that allows reasonably contemporaneous and continuous communication between the members taking part in the meeting.

- 23.5 A school council member who takes part in a school council meeting under section 23.4 is taken to be present at the meeting.
- 23.6 A coopted student member does not have the power to vote on a matter before the school council.
- 23.7 Unless the school council members present at a meeting decide otherwise, the order of business at a school council meeting is:
 - a) Apologies;
 - b) Confirmation of minutes of previous meeting;
 - c) Business arising from minutes of previous meeting;
 - d) Correspondence;
 - e) Business arising from the correspondence:
 - f) Reports;
 - g) Motions on notice;
 - h) General business;
 - i) Next meeting.

24 Minutes and records

- 24.1 The school council must record particulars of all proceedings at meetings of the school council including:
 - a) the names of the members present at each meeting of the school council; and
 - b) the names of any persons who are not members present at each meeting of the school council; and
 - c) the names of any members voting against a resolution carried at a school council meeting and any members abstaining from voting who wish to have their dissent or abstention recorded in the minutes of that meeting.
- 24.2 The minutes of each school council meeting must be submitted for confirmation at the next school council meeting.
- 24.3 A copy of the minutes of each meeting must be distributed to all members of the school council as soon as possible after the meeting.
- 24.4 The school council is a public authority for the purposes of the *Public Records Act 2002* (*Qld*) and roust deal with the school council's records (including all documents created or acquired in the course of the school council carrying out its functions) in accordance with that act and the Department of Education, Training and Employment's policy document "General Retention and Disposal Schedule for Administrative Records".

25 Attendance by proxy

- 25.1 A member of a school council for a state school may not attend a meeting of the school council by proxy.
- 25.2 However, the principal may attend up to 2 meetings in each year by proxy.

25.3 An alternative Parents and Citizens' Association member appointed under clause 5.2is not a proxy for the purposes of this clause 25.

Miscellaneous matters

26 Amendments to the Constitution

- 26.1 A school council may prepare and adopt an amendment to this constitution.
- 26.2 An amendment to this constitution has no effect unless it is approved by the Chief Executive or delegate authorised in writing by the Chief Executive.
- 26.3 Notice of a meeting to consider a proposed amendment must be given at least 30 days before the school council meeting to:
 - a) the school council members;
 - b) the parents and citizens' association (if one exists);
 - c) the school's staff (including, for example, by displaying the proposed amendment in a staff room);
 - d) the school's students (including, for example, by publishing the proposed amendment in the school's newsletter).
- 26.4 The amendment is required to be adopted by at least the quorum for the school council.
- 26.5 A proposed amendment must have regard to:
 - a) providing for a membership that:
 - i) allows adequate representation by parents, staff, students and other members of the school community; and
 - ii) takes into account the demographics of the school community;
 - b) providing for the school council to perform its functions in an effective and fair way;
 - c) being adequate, clear and appropriate; and
 - d) being consistent with the Act and otherwise lawful.

27 Application of laws

- 27.1 The members of the school council must comply with all applicable laws.
- 27.2 For the application of the Criminal Law (Rehabilitation of Offenders) Act 1986 (Qld), section 9A, to the office of an elected staff member, elected parent member or appointed member, of a school council, a person is taken to apply for the office if the person:
 - a) consents to be appointed as an appointed member(whether or not the school council has decided to appoint the person); or
 - b) stands for election as an elected member.
- 27.3 A school council is a public authority under the Public Records Act 2002.
- 27.4 For the application of the Public Sector Ethics Act 1994 (Qld):
 - a) a school council is a public sector entity; and

- b) a member of the school council is a public official of the entity;
- c) the Chief Executive is the chief executive officer of the entity; and
- a reference to the entity's annual report is a reference to the Department of Education, Training and Employment's annual report.

28 Dissolution of the School Council

- 28.1 A school council is dissolved:
 - a) if the school for which it was established is closed;
 - b) if the Minister gives the school council a notice stating that the school council is dissolved:
 - c) if the Chief Executive publishes a notice in the gazette stating that the school council is dissolved; or
 - d) in other circumstances prescribed under the Regulation.
- 28.2 On dissolution, the members of the school council go out of officeimmediately before the dissolution.
- 28.3 As soon as practicable after the dissolution of the school council, the school's principal must ensure the school council's records, including all documents held by the school council that it has created or acquired in the course of performing its functions are given to the Chief Executive.

29 Subcommittees

29.1 A school council must not establish a committee or subcommittee.

ESTABLISHING A SCHOOL COUNCIL

Initial Constitution

- 1. The principal must prepare a draft constitution.
- 2. In preparing the draft constitution, the principal:
 - must consult with:
 - o the parents of children attending the school; and
 - o the school's staff and students; and
 - may consult with other appropriate entities.
- 3. In preparing the draft constitution, the principal must have regard to this model constitution.
- 4. A draft constitution must:
 - · provide for a membership that-
 - allow adequate representation by parents, staff, students and other members of the school community; and
 - take into account the demographics of the school community;
 - provide for the school council to perform its functions in an effective and fair way;
 - be adequate, clear and appropriate; and
 - be consistent with the Act and otherwise lawful.
- If a Parents and Citizens' Association exists for the school, the president of the Parents and Citizens' Association must, under the Parents and Citizens' Association's constitutioncall a special meeting of the Parents and Citizens' Association to approve the draft constitution by secret ballot.
- 6. The principal must call the following meetings for approving the draft constitution by secret ballot:
 - if there is no Parents and Citizens' Association formed for the school—a meeting of the parents of child exattending the school (the parent meeting);
 - a meeting of the school's staff (the staff meeting).
- The draft constitution has no effect unless it is approved by the Chief Executive or delegate authorised in writing by the Chief Executive.

Initial membership

- 8. On its establishment, the school council consists only of its official members.
- However, a school council consisting only of its official members may only perform the functions necessary for the election of the school council's elected members.



- 10. As soon as practicable after a school council is established, its official members must, under the school council's constitution, organise the election of the school council's elected members.
- 11. The term of office for elected or appointed members must not exceed two years. However, the following number of the council's first elected members may hold office for a term of not longer than 3 years:
 - a. if one-half of the number of the first elected members is an even number, then one-half of the number of the first elected members;
 - b. if one-half of the number of the first elected members is an odd number, then the whole number next higher than one-half of the number of the first elected members.
- 12. The written notice of the results of the first election for the school council must show clearly which of the elected offices are to be held for a term other than 2 years and this detail must be recorded.
- 13. After the election, the school council, as constituted by its official members and elected members, may appoint the council's appointed members.

Staff and Parent Election Procedures

- For staff and parent elections, the official members must appoint a returning officer for the election.
- The returning officer must give public notice (e.g. school newsletter) of the holding of an election not less than 28 days before the date of the election.
- The notice must name the date of the election and the final date for the receipt of nominations.
- The final date for receipt of nominations must not be less than 14 days after the date of giving of the public notice and not less than 14 days prior to the date of the election.
- Also, the notice must name the meeting venue at which the election is to be conducted, the day
 or days on which the meeting is to be held, and the start and end times for the meeting,
 including any time when the meeting is to be adjourned.
- After the final date for receipt of nominations, the returning officer must, without unreasonable delay, prepare voting papers by setting out the names of the candidates in an order determined by lot.
- At the meeting at which the election is to be conducted, the returning officer must give a voting paper to every person entitled to vote at the election.
- The returning officer must record the name of each person to whom a voting paper is given at the meeting at which the election is conducted.
- Each voter must deposit their completed voting paper into a sealed ballot box before leaving the meeting.
- The returning officer must take such steps as considered necessary to ensure that only persons
 entitled to vote at an election have voted and that the secrecy of the ballot is preserved.
- If there are fewer nominations than required elected members, then the nominees are elected

Post Ballot Procedures

- Each candidate may appoint by written notice to the returning officer, one scrutineer for the
 examination of the voting papers received by the returning officer, to be present when the
 returning officer opens the ballot box containing the voting papers on the day of the election.
- A notice of an appointment of a scrutineer by a candidate must be received by the returning officer not less than 5 days prior to the day of the election.
- No election is invalid by reason of the failure of any candidate to appoint a scrutineer or the failure of a person appointed as a scrutineer to carry out the duties of a scrutineer.
- After the meeting at which the election was conducted and on the day of the election, the
 returning officer must, in the presence of the scrutineers but not the candidates, and with the aid
 of any assistants who are not candidates, open the ballot box containing the voting papers.
- If, in examining a voting paper, the returning officer forms the opinion that the intention of the
 voter cannot with certainty be ascertained, the voting paper must be rejected by the returning
 officer and no votes on that voting paper may be counted.
- If, in examining a voting paper, the returning officer forms the opinion that a vote is indicated on other than a voting paper in the form approved by the returning officer, the vote must not be counted.
- If, in examining the voting papers, the returning officer forms the opinion that:

- i) the number of voting papers in the ballot box is not equal to the number of persons who have been recorded as having voted in the election; or
- any voting paper has been altered or otherwise interfered with after being placed in the ballot box and prior to the ballot box being opened by the returning officer or at the returning officer's instruction,

the returning officer must declare the ballot to be invalid and make arrangements for the holding of another ballot to determine the result in the election.

- After examining the voting papers, the returning officer must ascertain the number of votes received by each candidate.
- The candidate who receives, or the candidates who receive more votes than any other candidates in the election must be declared by the returning officer to have won the election.
- Where two or more candidates have received an equal number of votes, the returning officer must determine by lot which of the candidates is to be declared elected

Declaration of Result

When the returning officer has determined which of the candidates is to be declared elected, he
or she must prepare, sign and date a written statement, which may be countersigned by any
scrutineers who are present, containing the numbers in words as well as figures of the votes for
each candidate and declaring the result of the election.

No election is invalid by reason of:

- any formal error or defect in any declaration made, or in giving public notice under this constitution
- the giving of any such public notice being out of time
- any delay in holding the election at the time appointed
- any inadvertent failure to give to any person entitled to vote at the election any notice or ballot paper
- any other error or defect of a purely formal nature, which is not relevant to the outcome of the election.

Student Election Procedure

- For a student election, the principal is the returning officer, or must appoint another person to be the returning officer for the election.
- A student election may take place at the same time as, or combined with, other elections at the school involving students, including, for example, the election of the school's student leaders.

Election of Office Procedure

- Members roust self-nominate in person at the relevant meeting.
- If there is only one nomination for a position, the nominee will be elected to the relevant office.
- If there is more than one nomination for a position, the nominee who receives the majority of the votes will be elected to the relevant office.
- Voting is held by a show of hands.

Purpose

Under the <u>Education (General Provisions) Act 2006</u> (the "Act") (\$.79), the chief executive may establish a school council for a state school with the purpose of improving student learning. This procedure outlines processes for the establishment, operations and dissolution of school councils.

Overview

School councils can be established in state schools and will enable greater involvement of the school community and other stakeholders, such as industry, in setting the strategic direction for the school.

The functions of a school council (s.81 of the Act) are to:

- monitor the school's strategic direction;
- approve plans and policies of the school of a strategic nature, or other documents affecting strategic matters including the annual estimate of revenue and expenditure for the school;
- monitor the implementation of the plans, policies and other documents mentioned above;
 and
- · advise the school's principal about strategic matters.

The council must perform its functions in a way that achieves the best learning outcomes for the school's students (s.81(2)) of the Act).

A school council may not:

- interfere with management by the school's principal of day-to-day operations of the school and its curriculum;
- · make operational decisions about the use of teaching or learning resources at the school;
- make decisions about the individual teaching style used, or to be used, at the school;
- · make a decision that is contrary to law or a written policy of the department;
- · have control of funds;
- · enter into contracts;
- · acquire, hold, dispose of or deal with property;
- · sue or be sued; or
- · establish a committee or subcommittee.

School councils will comprise of at least six, but not more than 15 members. A school council

must include at least one <u>elected parent member</u> and one <u>elected staff member</u> (the number of elected parent members and elected staff members of a school council must be equal).

A school council may include at least one but not more than two elected student members and two appointed members. <u>Elected student members</u> can only be students from Years 10, 11 or 12 at the school. A school council may appoint a coopted student from Year 7 in primary schools, however these students are unable to vote.

The size of the school will determine the number of parent, staff and student members on the school council.

School council elections should be held at the beginning of the year, either in February or March.

Each elected member, or appointed member, of a school council holds office for two years unless the school council decides otherwise as stated in the council's <u>constitution</u>. However, if newly established, half of the first elected members may hold office for a term of not longer than three years.

A member of a school council does not incur civil liability for an act done, or omission made, honestly and without negligence under section 117 of the Act.

A school council will be dissolved if:

- a school (for which a school council is established) closes (s. 112 of the Act); or
- the Minister dissolves the school council for noncompliance with a written direction (s. 55 of the Regulation); or
- the Chief Executive dissolves the school council because the school council is not satisfactorily performing its functions or the school community generally supports the dissolution of the school council (s. 56 of the Regulation).

Responsibilities

Principal

- Prepare an initial draft <u>constitution</u>, in consultation with parents and school staff and/or other appropriate entities, for the establishment of a school council for the Director-General or delegate to approve (s.109 of the Act).
- Ensure that a parents and citizens' association (P&C) meeting and school staff meeting are held for approving the draft constitution. If the school does not have a P&C, a meeting of the parents of children attending the school must be held.
- · Assume the position of an official member of the school council.
- Inform the school council of legislation and departmental policies.

School Council members

- · Establish strategic direction and priorities of the school.
- Develop relationships between the school and the community, and between the school and community organisations.
- · Approve the school's strategic plan.
- · Comply with the code of conduct.

School councils are to ensure that appropriate processes are followed, as outlined in the:

Definitions

Appointed Member (s.77 of the Act)

A local community, business or industry person appointed without election by the council.

Chairperson (s. 77 of the Act)

A member of the council who presides at meetings, manages the business of and provides leadership to the council.

Constitution (s. 94 of the Act)

The school council constitution that provides for membership, elections, conduct of business, the way that the council performs its functions and other appropriate matters.

Coopted student member (s.77 of the Act)

Where a school council is established for a primary school, a Year 7 student may be co-opted as a member of the council under the council's constitution.

Elected parent member (s. 77 of the Act)

A parent of a child at the school elected by other parents to be a member of the school council.

Elected staff member (s. 77 of the Act)

A member of staff at the school, elected by other staff members to be a member of the school council.

Elected student member (s.77 of the Act)

Means a student in Year 10, 11 or 12 who is elected by a poll, held under the council's constitution, in which only those students may vote.

Official member (s.77 of the Act)

The school's principal and the P&C president.

Quorum (s.99 of the Act)

A quorum for a council is the number equal to two-thirds of the number of its members or, if two -thirds is not a whole number, the next highest whole number.

Returning officer

A person who is responsible for overseeing the election process for school council elected members.

Scrutineer

Scrutineers are appointed by candidates for election as elected members to observe the voting, and counting of the votes. Scrutineers have the right to be present when the ballot boxes are sealed and opened and when the votes are sorted and counted so that they may check any possible irregularities.

Secretary

A member of the council who undertakes all administration regarding the council, and creates and maintains records. The secretary assists the chairperson in facilitating the effective operation of the council's business.



AGENDA ITEM: INDEPENDENT PUBLIC SCHOOLS

RESPONSE:

- Consultation has occurred with the Principals' Associations on the development of the Queensland Independent Public Schools program (24 April and 16, 17 May 2012).
- Principal Associations have advocated for a continuum approach, so as to not create an environment of the 'haves' and 'have nots', and would like to see a model that would work should it be rolled out to all state schools in Queensland.
- A number of questions were posed by the Queensland Secondary Principals Association at the first meeting. It appears that most of the questions or issues have been addressed to QSPA's satisfaction.
- The main issue that remains a concern for both the QSPA and QASSP, is the proposed ability for Independent Public (IP) schools to be able to recruit staff directly. The Principals' Associations have concerns this will negatively impact on the difficult to staff schools and may undermine the effectiveness of the transfer process.
- A clear message that the IPS is limited to 120 schools and a commitment to the transfer process should allay these concerns.
- QSPA also raised a number of questions regarding the proposed performance agreements that IP principals would have with the Director-General, these include:
 - implications should the Principal not meet the key performance indicators in the performance agreement
 - practical considerations such as who would complete references for these principals, and

- practicality of the Director-General managing 120 performance agreements.
- EQ will work with QSPA and other stakeholders to identify processes to support the effective implementation of the IP schools.

"That ICPA (QId) Inc liaise as a matter of priority with DETE and the Queensland Teachers Union to seek further information and clarification about the potential impact the Independent Public Schools initiative will have upon small schools and communities prior to schools lodging applications to participate in the Independent Public school initiative."

Explanation: Schools are currently being invited to apply for independent Public School status, with 30 schools expected to be accepted in 2013. Additional schools will be added in subsequent years.

Whilst the somewhat sparse information on the Education Old website promotes the initiative as positive, specific details are lacking, particularly with regards to its implementation in small, geographically isolated schools

\$50 000 is promised as an incentive to those schools embracing the initiative. With this however, comes additional autonomy and responsibility such as the payment of wages. In small schools, Principals are often very inexperienced. If the budget is tight, will a school principal transfer an experienced teacher who is entitled to a superior wage in exchange for a first year teacher whose minimal wage is locked in for the first 3 years, in order to satisfy budgetary constraints?

There is also grave concern that principals in small schools whose workload is already excessive, that their priority will become balancing the books as the alternative to teaching our children.

The independent public school initiative also asks that a school board be established and take responsibility for school based decisions, including hiring and firing of staff. In small communities the pool of potential board members will be limited, and decisions will potentially result in community division.

Background

- The Independent Public Schools initiative delivers on the LNP Government's election commitment to give Queensland principals, teachers, parents and local communities greater control and ownership of their schools as well as greater input into decisions that affect them.

 - select their own deputy principals and heads of department when vacancies occur
 - select casual and temporary teachers through departmental processes
 - manage minor maintenance and minor capital works projects up to \$100 000
 - o mariage school utilities and retain savings
 - expend the school bank account to a maximum of \$250 000
 - sign or vary contracts with procurement approval and dispose of plant and equipment up to the expenditure delegation.


